LET GOD RESPOND TO OUR NEEDS

A multi-millionaire died after a massive heart attack, during his extravagant funeral service a question was asked: "How much did he leave behind?" "Everything!" "And look at his hands, both are emptied, he brings with him nothing." A man is murmuring to himself.

In the Gospels we generally have a biased balance. We have parables that urge us to provide for the future, to plant and to reap, and to use the talents that we have been given. This weekend we are told in the Beatitudes of Saint Luke "How happy are you who are poor: yours is the kingdom of God." Another translation says, "Blessed are those who know their need for God." Blessed means deep-down peaceful and contented. Being blessed may not mean we have everything we want, but we are contented, joyous and grateful for our life. If we are blessed, everything in our life contributes to our love of life and of God. This first of the Beatitudes is very much disputed if we treasure the material world rather than the spiritual qualities. What Jesus meant by this kind of poverty is not always easy for us to grasp. The reason for the difficulty, however, lies not in our intelligence or in the cleverness of our scholarship. The difficult lies in our pride.

What does it mean then to be poor? We are poor when we know that we do not have enough. When we turn inward we know that of ourselves we aren't enough. We know that we are in need. What do we need? Money? Look at rich people, do they need money? Why do they still want more? We need more than just material things! We need love and relationship. we need sharing and giving. We need guidance. We need harmony and peace. We need a sense of direction and inner growth. We know we need these things. We are willing to see our needs imply change. That can make us uneasy because of our pride. But if we turn and trust in God who will fulfil and respond to our needs then God's reign is established in our living. 'The Sermon on the Mount' is the fundamental teaching of Jesus about life as it is possible to us.

Let us pray that we will be eager in exchanging our pride for open-handed dependency, so that God can direct our everyday living with peace, guidance, loving security and all the rest.

The Catechism of the Catholic Church

1723 The beatitude we are promised confronts us with decisive moral choices. It invites us to purify our hearts of bad instincts and to seek the love of God above all else. It teaches us that true happiness is not found in riches or well-being, in human fame or power, or in any human achievement - however beneficial it may be - such as science, technology or art, or indeed in any creature, but in God alone, the source of every good and of all love.

Saints of the Week



Peter was born in Italy in 1007. When his parents died, he went to live with one of his older brothers, who treated him cruelly. Sometimes Peter was forbidden to eat any of his brother's food. Another brother helped solve the problem by giving Peter money so that he could afford to

go away to school.

Peter did so well in school that he became a professor when he was only 25. After the school day was finished, Peter often invited students and poor people to his home for dinners that he served himself. He remembered what it felt like to be hungry.

Peter became a priest and then a Benedictine monk. He spent his days in prayer and study. After a short time Peter was elected abbot, or superior, of the community. Although this new responsibility took Peter away from his quiet life, he was an excellent leader. So many men were attracted to religious life because of his example that he established five new monasteries. Peter was ordained the bishop of Ostia, a diocese near Rome. As bishop, Peter worked to solve problems in his diocese and to remind his priests of their mission.

Pope Stephen X recognized Peter's gifts and asked him to represent the Church in settling disputes and helping to stop practices that were preventing the Church from doing Christ's work in the world. Peter was so skilled as a peacemaker and reformer that he advised seven popes and travelled to many places representing the Holy Father. He worked with priests, bishops, kings, and emperors—all to serve Jesus.

As a monk, a bishop, and a saint, Peter Damian lived one of the Benedictine Rules completely: "Do not prefer anything to the love of Christ." He died in 1072 and is considered to be a Doctor of the Church. St. Peter Damian helps us to remember that if we put Jesus first in our lives, the Lord will always guide us in living as his faithful disciples.

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The Chair of St Peter

The actual chair of Peter in Rome, the wooden throne at St. Peter's Basilica, was given to Pope John VIII by the Holy Roman Emperor Charles the Bald in the year 875. It was enclosed in bronze by the artist GianLorenzo Bernini in 1647. This feast day also commemorates the primatial authority of St. Peter.

St Polycarp

Polycarp, bishop of Smyrna, disciple of Saint John the Apostle and friend of Saint Ignatius of Antioch, was a revered Christian leader during the first half of the second century.

Saint Ignatius, on his way to Rome to be martyred, visited Polycarp at Smyrna, and later at Troas wrote him a personal letter. The Asia Minor Churches recognized Polycarp's leadership by choosing him as a representative to discuss with Pope Anicetus the date of the Easter celebration in Rome—a major controversy in the early Church.

His Letter to the Philippians was a significant foundation of early Christian literature, establishing the role of Apostle Paul and referencing the existence of other texts of the Bible's New Testament. Only one of the many letters written by Polycarp has been preserved, the one he wrote to the Church of Philippi in Macedonia.

Polycarp's dedication to religion ultimately led to his death. He was arrested and killed at the age of 86 by the Romans for refusing to abandon Christianity. He was led into the crowded Smyrna stadium to be burned alive. The flames did not harm him and he was finally killed by a dagger. The centurion ordered the saint's body burned. The "Acts" of Polycarp's martyrdom are the earliest preserved, fully reliable account of a Christian martyr's death. He died in 155.
