Why do Bad Things Happen to Good People?

Frank Rizzo (1920 -1991) an American ex-police officer and mayor of Philadelphia once said, "The streets are safe in Philadelphia. It's only the people who make them unsafe." Probably all of us have cried out at some time or another, "What have I done to deserve this?" Occasionally there is an obvious answer - if you drove home blind drunk then we can all tell you what you did to deserve getting smashed up in a car accident. Actions have consequences, and there's not much point complaining. But if you were the one sitting innocently in the bus shelter when the drunk ran into it, then there doesn't seem to be any connection. We still cry out, "What have I done to deserve this?"

Today, Jesus teaches us that suffering and prosperity are not punishments or rewards, but God's grace may eventually be exhausted by those who squander it. The people who approached Jesus to tell him of the murder of the Galilean worshippers were, judging by Jesus' response, apparently assumed that the only way such a thing could happen was that the victims were evil people who deserved God's punishment. Not only does Jesus deny the doctrine, not only does he refute the suggestion that God causes human misery to punish us, but he turns the question back to them and says, "But I tell you that unless you repent, you'll cop a similar fate."

Jesus is doing two very interesting things here. Firstly, he is emphasizing the priority of God's mercy over the inevitability of judgment. He doesn't deny the possibility of judgment, of the fig tree being eventually chopped down, but he does say that it will be given every opportunity to avoid it, including the best of nurture and care. There was (is) still time to change and that change should produce fruit. The time to begin was now! As the parable of the fig tree implies, we not only have a choice. We have a helper. Someone to care for us during our struggles and suffering. Someone greater than us, who came to save us.

And secondly, he is redefining repentance. Repentance means turning around, and we tend to focus on the life we turn away from. The New Testament word translated as repentance is metanoia which is the root of our word metamorphosis which means something like transformation. It is what happens to a caterpillar when it becomes a butterfly, and just like a butterfly, the emphasis is on what it turns into, not what it turned from. So when Jesus says "Repent," he is not so much saying, "Turn from sin," he's saying, "Turn to God."

Repenting of our past ways and following Jesus does not guarantee us safety from disaster, but it certainly opens the way to an abundance of life that is beyond what any disaster can destroy.

Catechism Theme: Suffering and the Test of Faith (CCC 163-165)

Faith gives us the first taste of the afterlife. In faith, we have a vision of life with God. An existence in pure justice and, at the same time, pure mercy. We will know ourselves as we truly are, but through the divine eyes of Love. This time on earth, however, is a time of test. Not just against evil. But for faith. The problem of suffering presents us with such a test. Suffering is more than an intellectual puzzle to be solved. It challenges us to act. Either we reach out in the belief that God will help us on the path. Or, we fade into in cynicism. Others have walked the path of test before us. Abraham, Mary, and Jesus himself. If we only look to their example, we can find inspiration and real help. Yes, suffering may shake us. But others have suffered and remained faithful. So can we.

The traditional focuses in Lent are prayer, fasting and almsgiving. The three go together. Pray is essential to the Christian life because in prayer we open ourselves to the presence of God and God leads us to be more aware of others. One good way to pray is to take the Lenten Sunday Gospel and use it as a basis for prayer throughout the week. The word of God becomes formative in our lives.

Fasting is not popular but it is a way of denying our selfish ambitions and desires and again making us more sensitive to the needs of others. The true Lenten fast is a fast from sin and selfishness and this finds expression in a fast from food and drink.

To be sensitive to others leads us, both individually and as communities, to want to do something for those in need. Almsgiving is about giving freely and generously of what we have and sharing with others whose quality of life may be less than our own.

The Annunciation of the Lord



The Annunciation is a day of celebration for Christians throughout the world. Many religious including the Catholic Church, the Lutheran Church, the Greek Orthodox religion, and others hold the Annunciation as a very important day of religious life. The day commemorates the visit of the Archangel Gabriel to the Virgin Mary, during which he informed her

that she would be the mother of Jesus Christ, the Son of God. It is celebrated on 25 March each year. In the Roman Catholic Church, when 25 March falls during the Paschal Triduum, it is transferred, even if it fall on Pascha (Easter). The concurrence of these two feasts is called Kyriopascha.

Moses was looking after the flock of Jethro, his father-in-law priest of Midian. He led his flock to the far side of the wilderness and came to Horeb, the mountain of God. There the angel of the Lord appeared to him in the shape of a flame of fire, coming from the middle of a bush. Moses looked; there was the bush blazing but it was not being burnt up. 'I must go and look at this strange sight,' Moses said, 'and see why the bush is not burnt.' Now the Lord saw him go forward to look, and God called to him from the middle of the bush. 'Moses, Moses!' he said. 'Here I am,' Moses answered. 'Come no nearer,' he said. 'Take off your shoes, for the place on which you stand is holy ground. I am the God of your fathers,' he said, 'the God of Abraham, the God of Isaac and the God of Jacob.' At this Moses covered his face, afraid to look at God.

And the Lord said, 'I have seen the miserable state of my people in Egypt. I have heard their appeal to be free of their slave-drivers. Yes, I am well aware of their sufferings. I mean to deliver them out of the hands of the Egyptians and bring them up out of that land to a land rich and broad, a land where milk and honey flow, the home of the Canaanites, the Hittites, the Amorites, the Perizzites, the Hivites and the Jebusites.'

Then Moses said to God, 'I am to go, then, to the sons of Israel and say to them, "The God of your fathers has sent me to you." But if they ask me what his name is, what am I to tell them?' And God said to Moses, 'I Am who I Am. This' he added 'is what you must say to the sons of Israel: "I Am has sent me to you." And God also said to Moses, 'You are to say to the sons of Israel: "The Lord, the God of your fathers, the God of Abraham, the God of Isaac, and the God of Jacob, has sent me to you." This is my name for all time; by this name I shall be invoked for all generations to come.'

Second reading 1 Corinthians 10:1-6, 10-12 A reading from the first letter of St Paul to the Corinthians

I want to remind you, brothers, how our fathers were all guided by a cloud above them and how they all passed through the sea.
