#### Let your first words be, "Peace to this house!"

The Korean War was raging. A little village came under heavy artillery fire. In the village stood a Catholic church. Outside the church, mounted on a pedestal, was a statue of Christ. However, when the smoke of battle cleared away, the statue lay in fragments on the ground. A group of American soldiers helped the priest to collect up the fragments. Carefully they put the statue back together. They found all the pieces except the hands. They offered to fly back the statue back to America, and have hands made for it. But the priest refused. "I have a better idea", he said. "Let's leave it without hands. And we'll write on the pedestal the words: FRIEND, LEND ME YOUR HANDS. In this way passers-by will come to see that Christ now has no hands but ours with which to raise up the fallen."

The Apostles had been with Jesus for some time. During that time he had instructed them. But when he chose them, he chose them for a purpose – to spread the news of the kingdom of God. Now the time had come to involve them in that work. So he sent them out. Christianity is always like that. It is never something to be kept to oneself. It always involves an outreach to others. They were to offer to those they encounter a special gift that the world needs most: the gift of peace! He said to them, "Let your first words be, 'Peace to this house!" Somehow this greeting of the Apostles sums up the Church's entire message to all her children down through the ages; her first and last words to us, containing everything that is good and desirable. Jesus had promised at the Last Supper (Jn 14:27) that he would leave his peace to the Church as a legacy: Peace I bequeath to you, my own peace I give you; and then his first words after his resurrection as he appeared to them were: Peace be with you.

At the Mass, when after the consecration the risen Lord becomes present on the altar and the priest speaks the words: *The peace of the Lord be with you always;* let us be especially attentive to what we are being offered and let our response: And with your spirit; carry with it the intensity with which we long for this gift. Then sign of peace which follows will truly be what it is meant to be — not a display of human affection; not a noisy 'how are you going today?' but a profound sign that all about you may experience the peace of the risen Lord which comes from faith in him. The Mass prepares us and then, sends us into world — "to live the Mass." Jesus continues to ask each of us, "FRIEND WILL YOU LEND ME YOUR HANDS?" Christ now has no hands but ours with which to raise up the fallen; no feet but ours to seek out the lost; no ears but ours to listen to the lonely; and no tongue but ours to speak words of comfort to the lonely.

#### Link in the Catechism of the Catholic Church

CCC, 2471 The Christian is not to "be ashamed then of testifying to our Lord." In situations that require witness to the faith, the Christian must profess it without equivocation, after the example of St. Paul before his judges. We must keep "a clear conscience toward God and toward men."

CCC, 2472 The duty of Christians to take part in the life of the Church impels them to act as witnesses of the Gospel and of the obligations that flow from it. This witness is a transmission of the faith in words and deeds.



# Saints of the Week



St Augustine Zhao Rong

Christianity arrived in China by way of Syria in the 600s. Depending on China's relations with the outside world, Christianity over the centuries was free

to grow or was forced to operate secretly.

The 120 martyrs in this group died between 1648 and 1930. Eighty seven of them were born in China, and were children, parents, catechists or labourer, ranging in age from 9 to 72 years. This group includes 4 Chinese diocesan priests.

Augustine Zhao Rong was a Chinese soldier who accompanied Bishop John Gabriel Taurin Dufresse of the Paris Foreign Mission Society to his martyrdom in Beijing. Not long after his baptism Augustine was ordained as a diocesan priest. He was martyred in 1815. The Good News of Jesus Christ is intended to benefit all peoples; todays martyrs knew that.

Feast Day: July 9



St Benedict was a mere teenager when he left the sinful world to live a life fasting and praying in the desert mountains. After years of prayer, word of his holiness brought nearby monks to ask for his leadership. He warned them he would be too strict for them, but they insisted. He

set up twelve monasteries in Subiaco where monks lived in separate communities of twelve. Benedict left these monasteries when envious attacks made it impossible to continue the spiritual leadership he had taken.

It was in Monte Cassino he founded the monastery that became the roots of the Church's monastic system. Instead of founding small separate communities he gathered his disciples into one whole community. His own sister, Saint Scholastica, settled nearby to live a religious life.

In Latin the meaning of the name Benedict is: blessed. From benedictus meaning blessed. Famous bearers: 6th-century Italian saint Benedict of Nursia founded the Benedictine order of monks and nuns.

Feast Day: July 11

Patron: Students and Europe



St Henry son of Henry, Duke of Bavaria, and of Gisella, daughter of Conrad, King of Burgundy, was born in 972. He received an excellent education under the care of St. Wolfgang, Bishop of Ratisbon. In 995, St. Henry succeeded his father as Duke of Bavaria, and in 1002, upon the death of his cousin, Otho III, he was elected emperor. Firmly

anchored upon the great eternal truths, which the practice of meditation kept alive in his heart, he was not elated by this dignity and sought in all things, the greater glory of God. He was most watchful over the welfare of the Church and exerted his zeal for the maintenance of ecclesiastical discipline through the instrumentality of the Bishops. He gained several victories over his enemies, both at home and abroad, but he used these with great moderation and clemency. In 1014, he went to Rome and received the imperial crown at the hands of Pope Benedict VIII. On that occasion he confirmed the donation, made by his predecessors to the Pope, of the sovereignty of Rome and the exarchate of Ravenna. Circumstances several times drove the holy Emperor into war, from which he always came forth victorious. He led an army to the south of Italy against the Saracens and their allies, the Greeks, and drove them from the country. The humility and spirit of justice of the Saint were equal to his zeal for religion. He cast himself at the feet of Herebert, Bishop of Cologne, and begged his pardon for having treated him with coldness, on account of a misunderstanding. He wished to abdicate and retire into a monastery, but yielded to the advice of the Abbot of Verdun, and retained his dignity. Both he and his wife, St. Cunegundes, lived in perpetual chastity, to which they had bound themselves by vow. The Saint made numerous pious foundations, gave liberally to pious institutions and built the Cathedral of Bamberg. His holy death occurred at the castle of Grone, near Halberstad, in 1024.

# Gospel Luke 10:1-12, 17-20 A reading from the Holy Gospel according to Luke

The Lord appointed seventy-two others and sent them out ahead of him, in pairs, to all the towns and places he himself was to visit. He said to them, 'The harvest is rich but the labourers are few, so ask the Lord of the harvest to send labourers to his harvest. Start off now, but remember, I am sending you out like lambs among wolves. Carry no purse, no haversack, no sandals. Salute no one on the road.

'Whatever house you go into, let your first words be, "Peace to this house!" And if a man of peace lives there, your peace will go and rest on him; if not, it will come back to you. Stay in the same house, taking what food and drink they have to offer, for the labourer deserves his wages; do not move from house to house.

'Whenever you go into a town where they make you welcome, eat what is set before you. Cure those in it who are sick, and say, "The kingdom of God is very near to you." But whenever you enter a town and they do not make you welcome, go out into its streets and say, "We wipe off the very dust of your town that clings to our feet, and leave it with you. Yet be sure of this: the kingdom of God is very near." I tell you, on that day it will not go as hard with Sodom as with that town.'

The seventy-two came back rejoicing. 'Lord,' they said 'even the devils submit to us when we use your name.' He said to them, 'I watched Satan fall like lightning from heaven. Yes, I have given you power to tread underfoot serpents and scorpions and the whole strength of the enemy; nothing shall ever hurt you. Yet do not rejoice that the spirits submit to you; rejoice rather that your names are written in heaven.'

#### The Gospel of the Lord

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
