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Be ready for the Lord

There was a group of girls travelling on a bus to a company for a job interview. When the bus stopped, they all rushed out and tried to out run each other to get to the company first. One of the girls accidentally pushed an elderly woman who fell and dropped her handbag. They kept running except Michelle who felt sorry for this elderly woman, stopped and helped her to get up and gathered her handbag. The woman still shaking asked why they were in such a hurry. Michelle mentioned the name of the company and explained that they are trying to get there first for an interview. Michelle was anxious to get away but the older woman held onto her arm and requested Michelle walk with her. Michelle patiently and caringly walked with this elderly woman, as they passed the company's door, Michelle asked if the woman was alright to walk alone because she has to go in for the job interview. "It's OK I won't trouble you anymore" said the woman.

Michelle went inside, all her friends had already handed in their resume and were ready for an interview. Michelle handed in her resume, sat down and waited without much hope because there were too many people before her. To everyone's surprise Michelle's name was called first. She went in the interview room. There was the manager sitting at the desk and the elderly lady whom Michelle helped along the road. The lady said to Michelle: "This is my son." She turned to the man and said "This is the girl I told you about." Of course you can guess Michelle got the job!

Jesus sometimes plays the same trick on us. He comes into our lives in the form of the sickness that we would avoid, the project that falls through, the exam that we fail, the relationship that pains us, the neighbour that is hard to put up with, the poor that comes when we are already emotionally exhausted.

In the Gospel today Jesus recommends us first to not be afraid, 'for it has pleased the Father to give you the kingdom.' We are assured of the kingdom but we must be alert and responsive because it is found in unconventional wisdom. Then Jesus goes on by using imagery to make his point about being alert and ready for the coming of Christ into our lives. He does not come at the right time or in the expected way. Jesus comes like a thief in the night; he does not enter through the door or window but through the wall of the house.

Let us pray that we will always be ready when he comes at the hour which we don't know or never expect.

145: The Letter to the Hebrews, in its great eulogy of the faith of Israel's ancestors, lays special emphasis on Abraham's faith: 'By which he was to receive as an inheritance; and he went out not knowing where he was to go.' By faith he lived as a stranger and pilgrim in the promised land. By faith, Sarah was given to conceive the son of the promise. And by faith Abraham offered his only son in sacrifice.

Saints of the Week



St Maximilian Mary Kolbe

St. Maximilian Kolbe was born as Raymund Kolbe on January 8, 1894, in the Kingdom of Poland, part of the Russian Empire. He was a Polish Conventual Franciscan friar and a martyr in the German death

Camp of Auschwitz during World War II. St. Maximilian Kolbe was very active in promoting the Immaculate Virgin Mary and is known as the Apostle of Consecration to Mary. Much of his life was strongly influenced by a vision he had of the Virgin Mary when he was 12. Kolbe founded monasteries in Japan and India. To this day the monastery in Japan remains prominent in the Roman Catholic Church in Japan. On February 17,1941 Kolbe was arrested by the German Gestapo and taken to the Pawiak prison. Three months later, he was transferred to Auschwitz. It is said during the last days of his life Kolbe led prayers to Our Lady with the prisoners and remained calm. St. Maximilian Kolbe died on August 14 and his remains were cremated on August 15, the same day as the Assumption of Mary feast day.

The Assumption of the Blessed Virgin Mary

This significant feast day recalls the spiritual and physical departure of the mother of Jesus Christ from earth, when both her soul and her body were taken into heaven to live with her son Jesus Christ for ever. Human beings having to wait until the end of time for their bodily resurrection, but Mary's body was able to go straight to heaven

because her soul hadn't been tainted by original sin. Catholics celebrate the Feast of the Assumption of the Virgin Mary on August 15 each year. The Feast is also a Holy Day of Obligation.

Feast Day: August 15



St Stephen of Hungary

St. Stephen the Great (977-1038), was the son of the Magyar chieftain Geza. Stephen succeeded him as leader in 997. Already raised a Christian, in 996 he wed the daughter of Duke Henry II of Bavaria and devoted much of his reign to the promotion of the Christian faith. He gave his patronage to Church leaders, helped build

churches, and was a proponent of the rights of the Holy See. Stephen also crushed the pagan counterreaction to Christianity, forcibly converting the so-called Black Hungarians after their failed rebellion. In recognition of his efforts, Stephen was anointed king of Hungary in 1000, receiving the cross and crown from Pope Sylvester II. The remainder of his reign was taken up with the consolidation of the Christian hold on the region. His crown and regalia became beloved symbols of the Hungarian nation, and Stephen was venerated as the ideal Christian king. Canonized in 1083 by Pope St. Gregory VII, he became the patron saint of Hungary.

Second reading Hebrews 11:1-2, 8-19 A reading from letter of St Paul to the Hebrews

Only faith can guarantee the blessings that we hope for, or prove the existence of the realities that at present remain unseen. It was for faith that our ancestors were commended.

It was by faith that Abraham obeyed the call to set out for a country that was the inheritance given to him and his descendants, and that he set out without knowing where he was going. By faith he arrived, as a foreigner, in the Promised Land, and lived there as if in a strange country, with Isaac and Jacob, who were heirs with him of the same promise. They lived there in tents while he looked forward to a city founded, designed and built by God.

It was equally by faith that Sarah, in spite of being past the age, was made able to conceive, because she believed that he who had made the promise would be faithful to it. Because of this, there came from one man, and one who was already as good as dead himself, more descendants than could be counted, as many as the stars of heaven or the grains of sand on the seashore.

All these died in faith, before receiving any of the things that had been promised, but they saw them in the far distance and welcomed them, recognising that they were only strangers and nomads on earth. People who use such terms about themselves make it quite plain that they are in search of their real homeland. They can hardly have meant the country they came from, since they had the opportunity to go back to it; but in fact they were longing for a better

homeland, their heavenly homeland. That is why God is not ashamed to be called their God, since he has founded the city for them.

It was by faith that Abraham, when put to the test, offered up Isaac. He offered to sacrifice his only son even though the promises had been made to him and he had been told: It is through Isaac that your name will be carried on. He was confident that God had the power even to raise the dead; and so, figuratively speaking, he was given back Isaac from the dead.

Jesus said to his disciples: 'There is no need to be afraid, little flock, for it has pleased your Father to give you the kingdom.

'Sell your possessions and give alms. Get yourselves purses that do not wear out, treasure that will not fail you, in heaven where no thief can reach it and no moth destroy it. For where your treasure is, there will your heart be also.

'See that you are dressed for action and have your lamps lit. Be like men waiting for their master to return from the wedding feast, ready to open the door as soon as he comes and knocks. Happy those servants whom the master finds awake when he comes. I tell you solemnly, he will put on an apron, sit them down at table and wait on them. It may be in the second watch he comes, or in the third, but happy those servants if he finds them ready. You may be quite sure of this, that if the householder had known at what hour the burglar would come, he would not have let anyone break through the wall of his house. You too must stand ready, because the Son of Man is coming at an hour you do not expect.'

Peter said, 'Lord, do you mean this parable for us, or for everyone?' The Lord replied, 'What sort of steward, then, is faithful and wise enough for the master to place him over his household to give them their allowance of food at the proper time? Happy that servant if his master's arrival finds him at this employment. I tell you truly, he will place him over everything he owns. But as for the servant who says to himself, "My master is taking his time coming," and sets about beating the menservants and the maids, and eating and drinking and getting drunk, his master will come on a day he does not expect and at an hour he does not know. The master will cut him off and send him to the same fate as the unfaithful.

The servant who knows what his master wants, but has not even started to carry out those wishes, will receive very many strokes of the lash. The one who did not know, but deserves to be beaten for what he has done, will receive fewer strokes. When a man has had a great deal given

him, a great deal will be demanded of him; when a man has had a great deal given him on trust, even more will be expected of him.'
