The Resurrection and the Life of the World to Come

What have you been taught about the resurrection of the dead? What importance does this belief have in your life? What comfort does faith in the resurrection bring you? Looking beyond the veil of death is a natural human quest. In fact, we might point to such an inquiry as another line that separates us from other animals on our planet. We humans look beyond the limitations of our existence. We like to explore that which lies beyond our position in space and time. Our search for immortality is not unlike our quest for the ultimate, God. How do we know there is life after death? This was the question the Sadducees ("those who say that there is no resurrection") placed before

Now we could unpack Jesus' answer as it relates to understandings of marriage, and of the differences between life before death and life after death and how they relate to marrying or not marrying, but the stuff about marriage is not really the main point. The question about marriage is only a furphy designed to ridicule the idea of resurrection, and although Jesus does dignify it with a quick answer, he quickly turns to their main point: "The fact that the dead are raised Moses himself showed, in the story about the bush, where he speaks of the Lord as the God of Abraham, the God of Isaac, and the God of Jacob. Now he is God not of the dead, but of the living; for to him all of them are alive."

As God is alive, so too, are those who experienced him. If the God of Abraham, Isaac, and Jacob is the "Living God," then Abraham, Isaac, and Jacob must be alive in his presence - only the living can encounter the "Living God". And if Abraham, Isaac, and Jacob still live, then there must be a resurrection of the dead. Jesus has shown us the door through death to a new life. As long as we worship him, we can be assured that he will not abandon us. He wants us to live with him, forever! Jesus teaches us that things are different in the afterlife. There is no marrying, no begetting of children. Nor is there any need for it, since in heaven there is no death and only perfect love. All is centred on the glory of God.

Whom would you like to see in the next life? Remember to pray for the deceased relatives, friends and the souls in purgatory this month.

Catechism of the Catholic Church: Christ's Resurrection and Ours

988 - The Creed: the profession of our faith in God, the Father, the Son, and the Holy Spirit, and in God's creative, saving, and sanctifying action - culminates in the proclamation of the resurrection of the dead on the last day and in life everlasting.

993 - Faith in the resurrection rests on faith in God who "is not God of the dead, but of the living." But there is a better reason. As a God who makes history, he marked the centre point of all human affairs in the resurrection of his Son.

995 - To be a witness to Christ is to be a "witness to his Resurrection," to "[have eaten and drunk] with him after he rose from the dead." Our participation in the Eucharist already gives us a foretaste of Christ's transfiguration of our bodies.

St Martin of Tours

Saint Martin of Tours was born in in Savaria, Pannonia in either the year 316 or 336 AD. At the age of ten he attended the Christian church against the wishes of his parents and became a catechumen. When Martin was fifteen was required to join a cavalry About the age of 20, Martin

made clear to his superiors that he would no longer fight, following his formed Christian conscience. In 371, the city of Tours needed a new bishop and the people decided to call Martin to the office. He was the third bishop of Tours. As a Bishop Martin established a system of parishes to manage his diocese. Martin longed for more prayer and wanted to pursue a monastic life. In the year 372 Martin established an abbey at Marmoutier so he could retreat there and live as a monk with the many disciples he had attracted. The Monastery would be inhabited by the Benedictines. Martin died in Candes-Saint-Martin, Gaul in 397. He has become one of the most popular and recognizable Catholic Saints. Many miracles have been attributed to him. He even had a confrontation with Satan.

St Josaphat

Born in 1580 in the western Ukrainian region of Volhynia, John Kuntsevych did not become "Josaphat" until his later life as a monk. He also was not initially a full member of the Catholic Church, born to Orthodox Christian parents whose church had fallen out of communion with the Pope.

As a young monk was taking on an ambitious task, striving to reincorporate the Eastern Orthodox tradition with the authority of the Catholic Church in the era of its "Counter-reformation." Soon, as a priest, subsequently an archbishop, and ultimately a martyr, he would live and die for the union of the churches.

On a fall day in 1623 an Orthodox priest had been shouting insults outside the archbishop's residence, and trying to force his way inside. Josaphat had him removed, but the man assembled a mob in the town. They arrived and demanded the archbishop's life, threatening his companions and servants. Unable to escape, Josaphat died praying for the men who shot and then beheaded him before dumping his body in a river. St. Josaphat's body was discovered incorrupt, five years later. Remarkably, the saint's onetime rival - the Orthodox Archbishop Meletius - was reconciled with the Catholic Church in later years. St. Josaphat was canonized in 1867.

His example of faith inspired many Eastern Orthodox Christians to return to full communion with the Holy See in Rome.



First reading 2 Maccabees 7:1-2, 9-14 A reading from the second book of Maccabees

There were seven brothers who were arrested with their mother. The king tried to force them to taste pig's flesh, which the Law forbids, by torturing them with whips and scourges. One of them, acting as spokesman for the others, said, 'What are you trying to find out from us? We are prepared to die rather than break the laws of our ancestors.'

With his last breath the second brother exclaimed, 'Inhuman fiend, you may discharge us from this present life, but the King of the world will raise us up, since it is for his laws that we die, to live again for ever.'

After him, they amused themselves with the third, who on being asked for his tongue promptly thrust it out and boldly held out his hands, with these honourable words, 'It was heaven that gave me these limbs; for the sake of his laws I disdain them; from him I hope to receive them again.' The king and his attendants were astounded at the young man's courage and his utter indifference to suffering.

When this one was dead they subjected the fourth to the same savage torture. When he neared his end he cried, 'Ours is the better choice, to meet death at men's hands, yet relying on God's promise that we shall be raised up by him; whereas for you there can be no resurrection, no new life.'

Some Sadducees – those who say that there is no resurrection – approached him and they put this question to him, 'Master, we have it from Moses in writing, that if a man's married brother dies childless, the man must marry the widow to raise up children for his brother. Well then, there were seven brothers. The first, having married a wife, died childless. The second and then the third married the widow. And the same with all seven, they died leaving no children. Finally the woman herself died Now, at the resurrection, to which of them will she be wife since she had been married to all seven?'

Jesus replied, 'The children of this world take wives and husbands, but those who are judged worthy of a place in the other world and in the resurrection from the dead do not marry because they can no longer die, for they are the same as the

angels, and being children of the resurrection they are sons of God. And Moses himself implies that the dead rise again, in the passage about the bush where he calls the Lord the God of Abraham, the God of Isaac and the God of Jacob. Now he is God, not of the dead, but of the living; for to him all men are in fact alive.'
