# Rove: God's First Gift

In The Count of Monte Cristo classic, there is a scene in it where two men are being led into a public square to be rather gruesomely executed. But they walk with completely different demeanours, because one of them knows that the Count has intervened on his behalf and that at any moment, the courier will arrive with the order to pardon and release him. The other may, of course, harbour some wishful thinking that somehow, he might be pardoned, but no amount of wishful thinking can give him any confidence with which to face the future.

Hope is not wishful thinking. Hope is the confidence of the man who knows that even though he is still a prisoner at this moment, his release has already been secured. This hope is precisely the confidence of knowing that Christ has already defeated the forces of hostility and death. This is what we celebrate during the season of Easter. We are not vaguely wishing he might. We know he already has. We know he has because he continues to live and to love us freely and generously.

This portion of Jesus' farewell discourse falls on the heels of last week's gospel. As you remember, Jesus stated he lived in an intimate love with the Father. Now, Jesus would empower his followers to love same way he did. Jesus told his disciples to follow his example. Love each other. The love relationship between the Father and the Son, between the Son and his followers, became the paradigm for life in the Christian community.

Only when we begin to love God and reflect that love in daily living can we gain true insight. And influence others. When we, as Christians, show love, we reveal the life of God among people. Why? Simply because we affirm the presence of the Risen Lord with us. And we show others life of the Spirit within us. Love, then, is "the shoe leather of faith." Love is faith in action.

### Catechism Theme: The Holy Spirit and the Church (737 – 739)

The mission of the Holy Spirit is to bring everyone to Christ. The Spirit prepares everyone and invites them to Christ. With the gift of Christ's risen life, the Spirit unites all believers to Christ and places them in communion with the Father. Since the Spirit unites all in Christ, the Spirit builds up the Church Christ found on earth.

### St John 1 - Pope

A native of Tuscany in Italy, John was elected Pope while he was still an archdeacon upon the death of Pope Hormisdas in 523. At that time, the ruler of Italy was Theodoric the Goth who subscribed to the Arian brand of Christianity, but

had tolerated and even favoured his Catholic subjects. Theodoric's policy underwent a drastic change as a result of two events: the treasonable (in the sovereign's view) correspondence between ranking members of the Roman Senate and Constantinople and the severe edict against heretics enacted by the emperor Justin I. Theodoric threatened to wage war against Justin but ultimately decided to negotiate with him through a delegation of five Bishops and four senators. At its head he named Pope John. Little is known for certain about the nature of the message. What is known is that he succeeded in persuading the Emperor to mitigate his treatment of the Arians and thus avoid reprisals against the Catholics in Italy. The Pope's visit also brought about the reconciliation of the Western and Eastern Churches.

### St Bernadine of Siena

St Bernadine worked in the largest hospital in Siena, caring for plague victims, giving his all in this task. After then caring for a sick relative, he joined the Franciscans and was ordained in 1404. He criss-crossed Italy on foot, preaching several times a day. Especially known for his devotion to the Holy Name of Jesus, Bernardine devised a symbol—IHS, the first three letters of the

name of Jesus in Greek—in Gothic letters on a blazing sun. He died at age 64 on 20th May, 1444. Only six years later, in 1450, Pope Nicholas V canonized him as a saint.

Feast Day: May 20th



### St Christopher Magallanes

Saint Cristóbal Magallanes Jara, also known as Christopher Magallanes was born in 1869. He is a martyr and saint venerated in the Catholic Church who was killed without trial on the way to say Mass during the Cristero War after the trumped up charge

of inciting rebellion in 1927. He was Beatified on November 22, 1992 and Canonized on May 21, 2000 by Pope John Paul II.

Feast Day: May 21st



### St Rita of Cascia

St Rita was born Margherita Lotti in Roccaporena, Italy in 1381. She forced into an arranged marriage with a terrible man. She was mistreated for years. After 12 years of marriage, her husband was killed and her 2 sons died shortly after. She entered the convent and followed a life of charity. After praying to Our Lord to

"let her suffer like you," she was struck in the forehead with a thorn from the crucifix. The wound never healed and cause her pain until the day she died on May 22, 1457. Following her death, she was buried at the basilica of Cascia, and was later discovered to be incorrupt.
