## A Hidden Treasure - God's Kingdom

Mark Twain in Tom Sawyer says that all little boys dream of the possibility of finding buried treasure. Rarely does this ever happen. Tom and Huck did, but the likelihood of doing so for most people is very small.

In our day, we can store treasure in the bank or in a safe deposit box. But in Jesus' day, burying treasure was an extremely common way of safeguarding it. In fact, according to rabbinical law, burying a treasure was the most secure way of protecting it. One's treasure might be stolen by thieves or plundered by foreign invading armies. But if it were hidden skilfully, rarely it be detected.

Jesus likens the kingdom to objects of the greatest value. This value brings a response of total sacrifice and commitment. Jesus' point in the Parable of the Pearl of Great Price is similar to the Parable of the Hidden Treasure. They convey one and the same lesson. And that lesson is the exceptional worth of the kingdom of heaven and the necessity of a whole hearted response. The kingdom of God, Jesus teaches, is worth all and it requires all.

Treasure has a special connection to the heart, the place of desire and longing, the place of will and focus. The thing we most set our heart on is our highest treasure. God blesses us with spiritual goods that far outweigh the fleeting joys of any hidden treasure or the most valuable pearl. He alone can satisfy the deepest longing and desires of our heart. Are you willing to part with anything that might keep you from seeking true joy with Jesus?

Catechism of the Catholic Church: The Freedom of Faith

160 - To be human, one's response to God by faith must be free, and... therefore nobody is to be forced to embrace the faith against his/her will. The act of faith is of its very nature a free act. "God calls us to serve him in spirit and in truth. Consequently we are bound to him in *conscience*, but not coerced... This fact received its fullest manifestation in Christ Jesus." Indeed, Christ invited people to faith and conversion, but never coerced them.

### The 100 Person Limit and 4m2 Rule

The major changes are as follows:

- 1. The 4m<sup>2</sup> rule still determines the maximum number of people per building, but there is **now a restriction to 100 even in those large churches** where the 4m<sup>2</sup> rule might have allowed for a greater number.
- 2. Baptism, anointing and giving Holy Communion is regarded as of no greater risk than the service of food and drinks in restaurants and clubs which is allowed; with a suitable COVID Safety plan in place, these celebrations are permissible.
- 3. Congregational singing is still not allowed. Recent health advice has indicated that while droplets quickly fall to the ground, the aerosol emissions during singing promote too great a risk even for those adhering to the specified 1.5m physical distancing requirement.
- 4. Singers and choirs, however, are permissible, on the following conditions:
- o singers are to be spaced at least 1.5m apart from each other and at least 4m distanced from the congregation, and
- o where choirs face each other, they must be at least 4m away from those they are facing.

Members of the congregation are discouraged from mingling before, during or after the service.

Parishioners who wish to attend Masses are required to provide their contact details (name and phone number or email address of one adult in each family) as they enter the Church.

# Saints of the Week



#### St Martha

Martha, Mary, and their brother Lazarus were evidently close friends of Jesus. He came to their home simply as a welcomed guest. The sisters feel free to call on Jesus at their brother's death, even though a return to Judea at that time seems

almost certain death. No doubt Martha was an active sort of person. On one occasion, she prepares the meal for Jesus and possibly his fellow guests and forthrightly states the obvious: All hands should pitch in to help with the dinner.

Martha's great glory is her simple and strong statement of faith in Jesus after her brother's death. "Jesus told her, 'I am the resurrection and the life; whoever believes in me, even if he dies, will live, and everyone who lives and believes in me will never die. Do you believe this?' She said to him, 'Yes, Lord. I have come to believe that you are the Messiah, the Son of God, the one who is coming into the world'" (John 11:25-27)

Feast Day: July 29



St Ignatius of Loyola was born in Spain. He was a soldier in the Spanish army in wars against the French. After the military he studied the Saints and decided to be a soldier of the catholic faith. Along with St Francis Xavier and 7 other students, started the Society of Jesus or Jesuits in 1534.

The Society of Jesus found its niche in education. Before Ignatius died in 1556, his order established 35 schools and boasted 1,000 members.

Today, the Society of Jesus is known for its work in educating the youth around the world. Several universities have been founded in the name of Ignatius and in the traditional Jesuit spirit. The Jesuits also perform many other important works around the globe.

Feast Day: July 31



St Alphonsus Liguori Bishop, Doctor of the Church, and founder of the Redemptorist Congregation. He was born in the village of Marianella near Naples, Italy on September 27, 1696. He was raised in a pious home. Educated at the University of Naples, Alphonsus received his doctorate at the age of sixteen. By age

nineteen he was practicing law.

Visiting a local hospital for Incurables on August 28, 1723, he had a vision and was told to consecrate his life solely to God. Alphonsus dedicated himself to religious life, even while suffering persecution from his family. He became bishop of Palermo in 1762.

For thirteen years he fed the poor, instructed families, reorganised the seminary and religious houses, taught theology, and wrote. He suffered daily from the pain from rheumatism that was beginning to deform his body. Deposed and excluded from his own congregation, Alphonsus suffered great anguish. But he overcame his depression, and he experienced visions, performed miracle, and gave prophecies.

He died peacefully on August, 1 1787, at Nocera di Pagani, near Naples as the Angelus was ringing. He was beatified in 1816 and canonized in 1839.
