FORGIVENESS

At Grace Lutheran Church in Atlanta, worshippers annually celebrate the end of the old year and the beginning of the new one with what they call a "burning service". Each member of the congregation brings to the altar a paper on which he or she has written failures and mistakes, plus changes to be made during the new year. The paper is dropped into a flaming urn. One year, two men who had once been friends, but had quarrelled over a business deal stood side by side at the altar. After dropping their papers into the urn, they got up, faced each other and shook hands.

In today's Gospel, the insecure Peter asks: "Lord, how often must I forgive my brother if he wrongs me? As often as seven times?" Seven times seemed to be a very generous number and he expected a pat on the back for it because he knew that Jesus put a high priority on forgiveness. But Jesus answered, "Not seven, I tell you, but seventy-seven times." And he went on to tell a parable story about a king who decided to settle accounts with his servants.

I often meet people who ask why should I forgive others for the wrongs they did to me? We forgive because we have been forgiven and in being forgiven we know that we are loved. When we know that we are loved we can love others and we in turn show it by forgiving them. The person who finds it hard to forgive is because he/she does not feel loved. Peter and Judas both were the great examples of this principle. Peter failed again and again, and particularly at the trial he denied Jesus three times. Yet when Jesus met him after the resurrection he accepted him in love and just said "Peace be with you." And when Jesus asked him, "Do you love me?" Peter responded "You know that I love you." It was as if he wanted to say that I love you because I know that you love me, and I know that from the way in which you forgave me. In contrast to Judas who also betrayed Jesus, but he could not accept forgiveness and committed suicide. Everyone who can not accept forgiveness locks him/herself into the past. They carry with them the guilt, the burdens, the hurts of the past and they can't accept the joys of the present moment.

Let us pray that we can get in touch with our own weakness and sinfulness but always trust in God's compassion and forgiveness. And may we reach out to show forgiveness to those who have wronged us particularly those whom we see

2843Thus the Lord's words on forgiveness, the love that loves to the end, become a living reality. The parable of the merciless servant, which crowns the Lord's teaching on ecclesial communion, ends with the words: 'So also my heavenly Father will do to every one of you, if you do not forgive your brother from the heart. 'It is there, in fact, 'in the depths of the heart', that everything is bound and loosed. It is not in our power not to feel, or to forget, an offence; but the heart that offers itself to the Holy Spirit turns injury into compassion and purifies the memory in transforming the hurt into intercession.

Sacraments of Healing

Reconciliation and Anointing of the Sick are the sacraments of healing that can be received more than once. These sacraments are a sign that God is present and active in difficult times, such as when we need to be forgiven or are challenged by illness.

Through these sacraments Jesus continues to forgive and heal us.

Liturgical colour: Green

The theological virtue of hope is symbolized by the colour green, just as the burning fire of love is symbolized by red. Green is the colour of growing things, and hope, like them, is always new and always fresh. Liturgically, green is the colour of Ordinary Time, the orderly sequence of weeks through the year, a season in which we are being neither single-mindedly penitent (in purple) nor overwhelmingly joyful (in white).

The Exaltation of the Holy Cross

Early in the fourth century, Saint Helena, mother of the Roman Emperor Constantine, went to Jerusalem in search of the holy places of Christ's life. She razed the second-century Temple of Aphrodite, which tradition held was

built over the Saviour's tomb, and her son built the Basilica of the Holy Sepulcher on that spot. During the excavation, workers found three crosses. Legend has it that the one on which Jesus died was identified when its touch healed a dying woman. The cross immediately became an object of veneration. At a Good Friday celebration in Jerusalem toward the end of the fourth century, according to an eyewitness, the wood was taken out of its silver container and placed on a table together with the inscription Pilate ordered placed above Jesus' head: Then "all the people pass through one by one; all of them bow down, touching the cross and the inscription, first with their foreheads, then with their eyes; and, after kissing the cross, they move on."

To this day, the Eastern Churches, Catholic and Orthodox alike, celebrate the Exaltation of the Holy Cross on the September anniversary of the basilica's dedication. The feast entered the Western calendar in the seventh century after Emperor Heraclius recovered the cross from the Persians, who had carried it off in 614,15 years earlier. According to the story, the emperor intended to carry the cross back into Jerusalem himself, but was unable to move forward until he took off his imperial garb and became a barefoot pilgrim.
