Generosity over Envy

The story is told of a man who died and went to heaven. St. Peter met him at the pearly gates and asked to examine his qualifications. "We have a point system," St. Peter said, and only those with enough points can enter." "Points?" the man asked, "I don't know what you're talking about." St. Peter explained, "It's simple. We determine how many points you have by the life you've led. We require a hundred points to get in. Tell me about your life, and I'll add up your points." The man thought for a moment and said, "Well, let's see. I was a faithful member of the church for over forty-seven years. I served as a deacon and an elder, and I taught Sunday School." St. Peter said, "Very good. You get one point."

The man said to himself, "Oh, my! Well, let's see, I was a good husband and a good father. I gave a tithe to the church, and I contributed to all sorts of charities. I helped with various civic projects, and I served on several committees. Doesn't that count for anything?" St. Peter said, "Indeed it does. You get another point." The man's face sank, and he said, "I can see now, I'll never make it. The only way I'd ever get into this place is by the grace of God." St. Peter smiled and said, "And that, my friend, is worth ninety-eight points. Welcome!"

Many are surprised at the parable of the landowner who goes out at different times of the day to hire workers for his vineyard. They find it unfair to give the same reward to everyone, without considering the labour and sacrifices of everyone. Without doubt Jesus has wanted to shock us and shatter the idea we obstinately cling to: that we have merits that God must recognize. In this parable, the goodness, generosity and openness of God are evident. All are treated on equal terms and receive one denarius each. A "denarius" was a silver Roman coin used as payment for a day's wage. Let them be happy for having been invited to work as they were unemployed.

"Could it be," the owner in the Gospel says, "that you are envious because I am generous?" Envy is certainly a very basic problem that can create all manner of trouble both in the community and in the individual. The vineyard workers, especially those who had worked the longer hours show this fundamental weakness, this selfishness, basis of all sin. Are we envious of the gifts of God to others? Shouldn't we rejoice with our brother or sister if God has been good to them? Why do we always want everything for ourselves and not for others, especially those for whom we don't have a liking? Our response to God's generosity should be the same: generosity.

Catechism of the Catholic Church Theme: The Person and Society

"All men are called to the same end: God himself." (CCC 1878) God created all of us as individuals and has the greatest personal concern for each one of us. His love established an order that makes the human person the highest value. "... the human person ... is and ought to be the principle, the subject, and the end of all social institutions." (CCC 1881) While society and institutions within society are necessary for the good of all, such are meant to serve the person. They should have limits to insure our freedom. "Charity is the greatest social commandment. It respects others and their rights. It requires the practice of justice, and alone makes us capable of it. Charity inspires a life of self-giving." (CCC 1889) Fr Richard

The 100 Person Limit and 4m2 Rule

The 4m² rule still determines the maximum number of people per building, but there is **now a restriction to 100 even in those large churches** where the 4m² rule might have allowed for a greater number.

Faith Matters

Confirmation – How is it distinct from Baptism?

Confirmation is the sacrament of strengthening and mission, traditionally bestowed on a person who is going to make a public confession of the Christian faith and face possible opposition. In contrast to baptism, which is the sacrament of spiritual birth, Confirmation confers maturity. Hence the one being confirmed is sealed with chrism and the sign of the cross and is strengthened by the gifts of the Holy Spirit, enabling that person to be moved by the Spirit in Christian mission. The clearest Biblical images of the effects of this sacrament are the way in which Jesus is led into the wilderness by the Spirit after his Baptism (Mt 4:1) and how the disciples preach the Gospel to the crowds after the descent of the Spirit at Pentecost (Acts 2).

three Sacraments of Initiation, namely: Baptism, Confirmation and Holy Eucharist. Any Catholic adults (baptised) but not yet confirmed. And those from other Christian denominations are received into full communion with the Catholic Church. The course for the RCIA candidates commences in November 2020.

Saints of the Week



St Matthew

Little is known about St. Matthew, except that he was the son of Alpheus, and he was likely born in Galilee. He worked as a tax collector, which was a hated profession during the time of Christ. According to the Gospel, Matthew was working at a collection booth in Capernaum when Christ came to him and asked,

"Follow me." With this simple call, Matthew became a disciple of Christ. From Matthew we know of the many doings of Christ and the message Christ spread of salvation for all who come to God through Him. The Gospel account of Matthew tells the same story as that found in the other three Gospels, so scholars are certain of its authenticity. His book is the first of the four Gospels in the New Testament. Many years following the death of Christ, around 41 and 50 AD, Matthew wrote his gospel account. He wrote the book in Aramaic in the hope that his account would convince his fellow people that Jesus was the Messiah and that His kingdom had been fulfilled in a spiritual way. It was an important message at a time when almost everyone was expecting the return of a militant messiah brandishing a sword. Nothing is recorded of Matthew's passing. We do not know how he died, if his death was natural or if he was martyred.

Feast Day September 21



St Pius of Pietrelcina the Italian Franciscan priest, better known as "Padre Pio" is known for his suffering, humility and miracles. He was originally named Francesco Forgione and was born in 1887. Francesco had already decided at a young age to dedicate his

entire life to God. On January 22, 1903, Francesco donned the Franciscan habit for the first time. He took the name Pio, a modernised Italian form of "Pius," in honour of Pope Pius V. He made his solemn vows four year later, and received priestly ordination in 1910. Shortly after, he first received the Stigmata - Christ's wounds, present in his own flesh. He suffered health problems and was forced to live apart from his Franciscan community for the first six years of his priesthood. In 1916 he managed to re-enter community life at the Friary of San Giovanni Rotondo, where he lived until his death. He handled many duties as a spiritual director and teacher. During 1917-1918, he briefly served in a medical unit of the Italian army. He later offered himself as a spiritual "victim" for an end to the war, accepting suffering as a form of prayer for peace. Once again, he received the wounds of Christ on his body. They would remain with him for 50 years, through a succession of global conflicts. By 1919, word began to spread about his stigmata and people came from far away to examine him. He became popular with the people he encountered and they soon began to attribute supernatural occurrences to him. He was able to levitate and to perform miracles. His popularity became a source of concern for the Church and the Vatican began to restrict his activities. Padre Pio himself was uncomfortable with his newfound popularity but he used this to open a hospital in San Giovanni Rotondo which opened in 1956. Padre Pio died in 1968, and was declared a saint in 2002.



Gospel Matthew 20:1-16 A reading from the Holy Gospel according to Matthew

Jesus told this parable to his disciples: 'The kingdom of heaven is like a landowner going out at daybreak to hire workers for his vineyard. He made an agreement with the workers for one denarius a day, and sent them to his vineyard. Going out at about the third hour he saw others standing idle in the market place and said to them, "You go to my vineyard too and I will give you a fair wage." So they went. At about the sixth hour and again at about the ninth hour, he went out and did the same. Then at about the eleventh hour he went out and found more men standing round, and he said to them, "Why have you been standing here idle all day?" "Because no one has hired us" they answered. He said to them, "You go into my vineyard too." In the evening, the owner of the vineyard said to his bailiff, "Call the workers and pay them their wages, starting with the last arrivals and ending with the first." So those who were hired at about the eleventh hour came forward and received one denarius each. When the first came, they expected to get more, but they too received one denarius each. They took it, but grumbled at the landowner. "The men who came last" they said "have done only one hour, and you have treated them the same as us, though we have done a heavy day's work in all the heat." He answered one of them and said, "My friend, I am not being unjust to you; did we not agree on one denarius? Take your earnings and go. I choose to pay the last comer as much as I pay you. Have I no right to do what I like with my own? Why be envious because I am generous?" Thus the last will be first, and the first, last.'
