Decision to love

A young woman is getting married and she is very apprehensive about her honeymoon. One of her friends from the youth group in the Church sent her a telegram, simply quoting 1John 4:18 ("There is no fear in love. Perfect love drives out fear, because fear has to do with punishment. The one who fears is not made perfect in love") But she mistyped and omitted the 1 before John. So it just reads: John 4:18 ("For you have had five husbands and the one you have now is not your husband...")

The Pharisees asked Jesus in today's Gospel which was the greatest - of the 613 laws. Jesus answered: "You must love the Lord your God with all your heart, with all your soul, and with all your mind - This is the greatest and the first commandment. The second resembles it: You must love your neighbour as yourself." In this Jesus was not talking about feelings but about a decision to be totally for God and then totally for the good of one's neighbour as one should be for one's own good. I often ask couples who are preparing for marriage "Why do you want to get married?" They often answer: "I want to marry this person because I love him/ her." If I ask them "Why do you love him/her?" Then usually the answer will be: "Because he/she makes me feel good and I am happy when he/she is with me!" Jesus reminds us that love is a decision, not simply just a feeling. Husbands and wives vow to love one another in good times and in bad, in sickness and in health, for the rest of their life. This is a decision, not a feeling. True love means to love even during a time when there are no more good feelings, or even negative feelings.

Dr Scott Peck defines love as, "The will to extend one's self for the purpose of nurturing one's own or another's spiritual growth." (A Road Less Travelled p.85) This definition includes self love with love for another. Since we are human, that is to love means to love ourselves as well as you. We are incapable of loving another unless we love ourselves.

The readings today challenge us to continue to love God and others in good times and in bad, to achieve this we need a good prayer life. Let us pray that we shall continue to grow in love of God and others. May we live this great commandment of love in our daily living.

Faith Matters

Receiving the Eucharist

To receive the bread of the Eucharist is to receive the Lord himself. We refer to Jesus' presence in the Eucharist as the *real* presence. We are not implying that all other types of presence (in the people gathered to worship, in the Scripture read, in the priest acting in the name of Jesus) are not real. We call the presence in the Eucharist real because it is Jesus' presence in the fullest sense.

In the old days people received Communion only on the tongue. Now it is more common to receive on the hand. It is not how we receive Communion, but the disposition with which we receive it, that matters. We should approach Communion with reverence and receive it with faith. Communion is not food for the perfect – if we were perfect, we wouldn't need it.

We receive Communion because we need to, and the Lord invites us. The prayer we say before we receive Communion says it all: "Lord, I am not worthy that you should enter under my roof, but only say the word and my soul shall be healed". This is a prayer that should come from our hearts. The Eucharist enables us to grow in intimacy and friendship with the Lord in a way that nothing else does.

Saints of the Week

Sts Simon and Jude




St. Simon the Apostle is often named St. Simon the Zealot, to distinguish him from St. Peter and St. Simeon. St. Simon was a Galilean, born at Cana in Galilee. He was called Simon the Zealot because of his great zeal to honour God and for purity of religion. The Zealots during this time

were known for assassinating the noble and filling the temple with bloodshed and profanities.

He was one of the original followers of Christ. After his conversion and his call, there is no further mention of him in the Gospels. He became zealous for Christ and for the duties of Christianity. After receiving the gifts of the Holy Spirit, he went out to evangelize with great zeal and fidelity. He was martyred by the idolatrous priests and many say that he was crucified. His relics are with St. Jude's in St. Peter's basilica and the Cathedral of Toulouse.

St Jude



many common characteristics with the second letter of St Peter. St. Jude (Thaddeus) is one of the most popular saints because of the numerous heavenly favours that he grants to his devotees who pray to him with faith, especially when seeking a job or a house. Ancient writers tell us that he preached the Gospel in Judea, Samaria, Idumaea, Syria, Mesopotamia, and Lybia. According to Eusebius, he returned to Jerusalem in the year 62, and assisted at the election of his brother, St. Simeon, as Bishop of Jerusalem. Saints Simon and Jude zealously preached to the nations and met with each other again in Persia. According to ancient tradition, they were martyred together - St. Simon was sawed in half and St. Jude was beheaded with an axe. Following his death, St. Jude's body was brought to Rome and left in a crypt in St. Peter's Basilica. Today his bones can be found in the left transept of St. Peter's Basilica under the main altar of St. Joseph in a tomb he shares with the remains of theapostle Simon the Zealot.


