Our Lord Jesus Christ, King of the Universe (Year A) 21st & 22nd November, 2020

Christ the King

A professor was one day walking along a very when he came face to face with a rival. The bridge was too narrow for two to pass. The rival, pulling himself up to his full height, said naughtily, "I never make way for fools!" Smiling, the professor stepped aside and said, "I always do."

Today we celebrate the Feast of Christ the King, Jesus is presented to us as the mocked king on the cross as well as the king of the universe. The greatest humiliation and the greatest victory are both shown to us in today's liturgy. It is an irony that our king is nailed naked on a cross, disgraced and powerless. He is challenged by the crowd, "If you are the Son of God.....come down from the cross." But Jesus will not succumb to the temptation to use his power for his own benefit or to prove himself. He is chided even by one of the condemned. "Save yourself and save us too." This humiliation is to fulfil God's will and to show how much God loves us through Jesus's suffering and death.

Furthermore, we have the image of Christ coming; "When the Son of Man comes in his glory, escorted by all the angels, then he will take his seat on his throne of glory." Jesus shows us how to prepare for that day; "Truly I tell you, just as you did it to one of the least of these who are members of my family, you did it to me." While the Pharisees reduced God to keeping the law. The Scribes identified God with theology and philosophical discussions. The Saducces identified God with money (a sign of God's blessing). The high priests identified God with liturgy and temple services. Jesus identifies himself as the hungry and thirsty, the stranger, the sick and the poor and he calls us to do something about it. His kingship was about love, healing, reconciling and compassion.

The Feast 'Christ the King' reassures us how much God loves us and calls us to reach out to the 'needy' around us.

"May today there be peace within. May you trust that you are exactly where you are meant to be. May you not forget the infinite possibilities that are born of faith in yourself and others. May you use the gifts that you have received, and pass on the love that has been given to you. May you be content with vourself just the way you are. Let this knowledge settle into your bones, and allow your soul the freedom to sing, dance, praise and love. It is there for each and every one of us."

Faith Matters THE FOUR LAST THINGS: DEATH, JUDGMENT, HEAVEN & HELL

The Church believes that a person faces the particular judgment at death. God judges our souls and finds us either able to enter heaven immediately, needing to go through further purification in purgatory or capable of hell because of our refusal to detach ourselves from sin and our unwillingness to repent. At the end of time, there will be a general judgment, at which time our bodies will be resurrected to join our souls in our eternal life, whether that be in heaven or hell.

What happens to us after death is an indication of our own personal, free choice to choose God and the path to holiness or to turn against Him. What happens after death also indicates who our God is - a God of both justice and mercy. As Christians, we should not fear death, but rather ready ourselves for it, by growing in holiness and striving for eternal life.

Saints of the Week



Sts Andrew Dung-Lac and Companions
Through the missionary efforts of
various religious families beginning in
the sixteenth century and continuing
until 1866, the Vietnamese people heard
the message of the gospel, and many
accepted it despite persecution and

even death. There are 117 martyrs in this group and although they died at different times, they were all canonized by Pope John Paul II on June 19, 1988. Of the group, 96 were Vietnamese, 11 were Spaniards, and 10 were French. There were 8 bishops, 50 priests and 59 lay Catholics in the group. Of the priests, 11 were Dominicans, 10 belonged to the Paris Mission Society, and the rest were diocesan priests plus one seminarian. Certain individual martyrs were mentioned by name in the process of canonization: Andrew Dung-Lac, a diocesan priest; Remembered as representative of the thousands of Christians tortured and martyred in Vietnam between the seventeenth and nineteenth centuries: bishops, presbyters, religious, and lay people, both children and adults. These martyrs gave their lives not only for the Church but for their country as well. They showed that they wanted the gospel of Christ to take root in their people and contribute to the good of their homeland.
