Jesus Calls All of Us

On a sunny morning, William's mother came into her son's room and said, "William, it's Sunday. Time to get up! Time to get up and go to church! Get up!" From under the covers came mumbles, "I don't want to go!" "What do you mean?" she said. "That's silly! Now get up and get dressed and go to church!" "No!" he shot back. "I'll give you two reasons. I don't like them and they don't like me!" "Nonsense," she told him. "I'll give you two reasons to go. First, you are 42 years old, and second, you are the pastor!"

Jesus begins his public ministry by proclaiming that the reign of God is at hand and urges us to repent and believe the good news. Where is the good news? All that one seems to see in the media is bad news: deaths, diseases, wars, bombings, terrorisms, violence and such like. Is there no good news to be reported? Jesus came to bring good news – a promise of love, a promise of forgiveness, of healing, of new life. How ought we to respond to that good news? Jesus calls us to reform our lives and believe the good news. Look around. See the good news. Become aware of God's love, mercy and compassion at work around you. Respond to that love. Share it with others. Be a messenger of the good news. This call is for everyone!

The call of Simon and his brother Andrew, as well as the call of James son of Zebedee and his brother John is our call too. Jesus called out to them as he calls out to us, "Follow me and I will teach you to catch people." They set their work aside at that moment and followed Jesus. Jesus called Peter and his friends to "catch people." In other words, they were to help others become followers of Jesus. After his death and resurrection, Jesus gave the Church the same mission he had. When we join the Church at Baptism, we are to do what Jesus did: spread the Good News through our worship of God, our service to others, and the type of example we give with our words and actions.

Jesus calls all of us to his mission of service. Some he calls to serve as single people. Some he calls to serve as married people. Some he calls to serve in their jobs and families. Some he calls to serve inside the Church.

Catechism of the Catholic Church: Christ is himself the source of ministry in the Church

875 "How are they to believe in him of whom they have never heard? And how are they to hear without a preacher? And how can men preach unless they are sent?" No one - no individual and no community - can proclaim the Gospel to himself: "Faith comes from what is heard." No one can give himself the mandate and the mission to proclaim the Gospel. The one sent by the Lord does not speak and act on his own authority, but by virtue of Christ's authority; not as a member of the community, but speaking to it in the name of Christ. No one can bestow grace on himself; it must be given and offered.

NSW Restrictions for Churches due to Covid-19

Faith Matters

Sacraments of Service (Part 1 - The Sacrament of Holy Orders)

There are two sacraments that are dedicated to serving others: Holy Orders and Matrimony. In the sacrament of Holy Orders, men serve the Church community as bishops, priests, and deacons.

A bishop has the fullness of Holy Orders. He is the primary pastor, worship leader, and chief teacher for the local Church community (also called a "diocese"). As the primary pastor, he leads the local Church with the same responsibilities Jesus gave the Apostles. He represents Christ to the local people. And he represents us, the faithful, to the other local Churches in the world. All the bishops throughout the world form a union (called a "college"). This united "college of bishops" is under the authority of the bishop of Rome, the Pope.

A priest serves the bishop as his representative. A priest can administer all the sacraments, except Holy Orders. He can be the pastor of a parish where he serves the people as their spiritual leader, worship leader, and religious teacher.

A deacon serves the Church as an assistant to the bishop and as an example of a faithful man to the people. A deacon can act as the Church's witness at baptisms, weddings, and funerals. A deacon has a special place at Mass when he reads the Gospel, preaches, and assists the priest.

Saints of the Week



St Thomas Aquinas surpassed all his fellow students in learning and virtue. He entered the order of St Domenic against his parents wishes and persevered in his vocation. He studied under St. Albert the Great and at age 22 began teaching and publishing his first works. At age 31 he received his doctorate. He wrote and preached often and was one

of the greatest and influential theologians of all time. He is one of the few Doctors of the Church.

Patron of students and all universities



St. Paul is the patron saint of missionaries, evangelists, writers, journalists, authors, public workers, rope and saddle makers, and tent makers. His feast day is on June 29 when he is honoured with Saint Peter, although he is also honoured on other days throughout the year, January 25, for his conversion, February 16, for his shipwreck, and November 18 for the dedication of his Basilica.

Jonah 3:1-5, 10
