Third Sunday of Easter (Year B) 17th & 18th April, 2021



There was a barber that thought that he should share his faith with his customers more than he had been doing lately. So the next morning when the sun came up and the barber got up out of bed he said, "Today I am going to witness to the first man that walks through my door." Soon after he opened his shop the first man came in and said, "I want a shave!" The barber said, "Sure, just sit in the seat and I'll be with you in a moment."

The barber went in the back and prayed a quick desperate prayer saying, "God, the first customer came in and I'm going to witness to him. So give me the wisdom to know just the right thing to say to him. Amen." Then quickly the barber came out with his razor knife in one hand and a Bible in the other while saying "Good morning sir. I have a question for you... Are you ready to die?"

Over the past two weeks, the Sunday gospels have recalled the confusion and fear caused by the Resurrection. The risen Christ stands in their midst and asks, "Why are you troubled? And why do questions arise in your hearts? Look at my hands and my feet, that it is I myself." His appearance turned their lives in a completely new direction. This Sunday added a new element to the disciples' vision experience: a context for understanding. This context would sustain the changes the Church would undergo in its first few generations of believers. They were to proclaim the Resurrection and God's offer of forgiveness. They are to be witnesses to 'these things'!

We too remain "credible witnesses" by conforming our lives to the truth we profess: especially Jesus' suffering, death and resurrection as well as the forgiveness of sins. As Catholics, we live authentically rooted in Christ's mercy not as a vague platitude or excuse for worldliness - but as the source of our hope, even when we are weak. We are called to share what we have seen, heard, and touched (1John 1:1) with others. We, like the early Christians, are to witness to God activity in his creation and among his people. May the Lord Jesus open our minds to better understand his Word and ways, so that we may never lose hope but reveal God's love to all the nations.

Catechism Theme: The Mission of the Church (CCC 849-856)

"All of you are witnesses to everything that has happened." As witnesses, the early disciples were charged to tell others what they saw. Not only did Jesus command them, the Spirit impelled them to preach to all nations as the Father desired. Hence the missionary activity of the early disciples, as it is now in the Church, stemmed from the activity of the Trinity. As Father, Son, and Spirit are now working in the world, they desire that we, the Church, lead all people into union with the Godhead.

NSW Restrictions for Churches due to Covid-19

Places of worship are now allowed to have one person per the 2m² with no maximum cap. From Monday, 29 March, no cap on numbers at funerals and weddings, provided a 2m² rule is observed.

PLEASE NOTE:

- Masks are no longer compulsory, but you are welcome to wear them if you feel more comfortable.
- Parishioners who wish to attend Masses are required to provide their contact details as they enter the Church. Registration forms are available on tables at the entrance of the Church.
- You could also use the QR Code option to register before entering the Church.

Faith Matters

What does the Apostles' Creed mean when it says that Jesus descended into hell?

By the expression "He descended into hell", the Apostles' Creed confesses that Jesus did really die and through his death for us conquered death and the devil "who has the power of death". The Latin and the Greek say that Jesus "descended to those below". In Hebrew terms that area of the dead was known as Sheol and for the Latin it was known as Hades. Christ conquered death, and opened the gates of Heaven to all people, those of his time, those who would come after him, and also those who lived before him, all the good people. It is a statement about the impact and power of the coming of the Kingdom of God amongst us.

St Anslem

Saint Anselm of Canterbury, also called Anselm of Aosta after his birthplace and Anselm of Bec after his monastery, was an Italian Benedictine monk, abbot, philosopher and theologian of the Catholic

Church, who held the office of Archbishop of Canterbury from 1093 to 1109.

Feast Day: April 21



St George was born to a Christian family in Cappadocia around the year 280. After moving to Palestine, he joined the army of Diocletian. When the emperor issued the edict of persecution against Christians in 303, George gave all his belongings

to the poor and, in front of Diocletian himself, tore the document apart and professed his faith in Christ. For this he suffered terrible torture and was eventually beheaded. Shortly after his death, a basilica was erected over the place of his burial in Lydda (modern-day Lod, in Israel). His relics are still visible today.

Feast Day: April 23



St Adalbert

Adalbert of Prague, known in Czech Republic, Poland and Slovakia by his birth name Vojtěch, was a Bohemian missionary and Christian saint.

He was the Bishop of Prague and a missionary to the Hungarians, Poles, and Prussians, who was martyred in his efforts to convert the Baltic Prussians to Christianity.

Feast Day: April 23



St Fidelis of Singmaringen

Franciscan Capuchin martyr. He was born Mark Rey in Sigmaringen, Germany, in 1577. A practicing lawyer, he travelled across Europe as a tutor to aristocrats but then started defending the

poor. In 1612, he became a Franciscan Capuchin monk, taking the name of Fidelis. A missionary to Grisons, Switzerland, Fidelis was so successful that local Protestants claimed that he was a spy for the Austrian Emperor. Fidelis was stabbed to death in a church id Seewis. He was canonized by Pope Benedict XIV. Fidelis served also as the head of the Congregation for the Spreading of the Faith.

But he said, 'Why are you so agitated, and why are these doubts rising in your hearts? Look at my hands and feet; yes, it is I indeed. Their joy was so great that they still could not believe it, and they stood there dumbfounded; so he said to them, 'Have you anything here to eat?'
