The Good Shepherd aboard a train, one of his shoes

One day as Gandhi slipped off and landed on the track. He was unable to retrieve it as the train was moving. To the amazement of his companions, without hesitation Gandhi calmly took off his other shoe and threw back along the track to land close to the first. Asked by a fellow passenger why he did so, Gandhi smiled, "The one who finds the shoes lying on the track, will now have a pair that he can use." Gandhi conscious of the needs of others, knew and lived Jesus' words closely. "I am the good shepherd. The good shepherd lays down his life for the sheep." There are three qualities that speak about a good shepherd that is 'understanding, caring and selfsacrificing'. For Jesus, the true disciple was the good shepherd who was deeply committed to his sheep. He knew where the good pastures were and led the sheep to them, even over rough ground. The good shepherd would lead and walk ahead of his flock.

Today's gospel on the Good Shepherd Sunday reminds us that Jesus considers each one of us as his own. His love and concern for us is always personal. "I know mine and mine know me, just as the Father knows me and I know the Father." While it is true that all of us belong to one human race, his love for each one of us is always uniquely special. He knows all of us by name. It is precisely because his love for each one is unique that the care he bestows is always suited to one's needs, one's temperament and psychological makeup. It is a love that respects and gives consideration for our individual uniqueness as persons.

We are all called to be good shepherds in our own right. Some of us may hold seemingly ordinary positions, but none of these are insignificant. For instance: parents to their children, teachers to their students, employers to their employees, priests to their parishioners etc.

Let us pray that we are all aware of our roles and commitments towards others especially to those whom we are called to be good shepherds to.

Catechism of the Catholic Church

754 The church is, accordingly, a sheepfold, the sole and necessary gateway to which is Christ. It is also a flock of which God himself foretold that he would be the shepherd, and whose sheep, even though governed by human shepherds, are unfailingly nourished and led by Christ himself, the Good Shepherd and Prince of Shepherds, who gave his life for his sheep.

"To hear and answer the Lord's call is not a private and completely personal matter fraught with momentary emotion. Rather, it is a specific, real and total commitment which embraces the whole of our existence and sets it at the service of the growth of God's Kinadom on earth. The Christian vocation, rooted in the contemplation of the Father's heart, thus inspires us to solidarity in bringing liberation to our brothers and sisters, especially the poorest. A disciple of Jesus has a heart open to his unlimited horizons, and friendship with the Lord never means flight from this life or from the world. On the contrary, it involves a profound interplay between communion and mission Fr Dominic (cf. Evangelii Gaudium, 23)."

NSW Restrictions for Churches due to Covid-19

A Brief Word about the Collection

At the beginning of the Liturgy of the Eucharist the gifts which will become Christ's Body and Blood are brought to the Altar. The Collection is something more than a necessary evil, a practical response to the needs of the poor and needy, or a pragmatic activity to keep the parish running financially. But, what is its spiritual connection to Mass? Certainly, more mature theological reflection needs to be brought to bear on this important action of the community to highlight its connection to the paschal mystery, the outpouring love of Christ before God. We must be conscious of this offering that we make. We must know that what we have offered to God is not lost, but rather fulfilled in love. Above all, through this act of offering, we ourselves must become a pleasing offering to God.



ints of the Week



St Mark

Much of what we know about St. Mark, the author of the Second Gospel, comes largely from the New Testament and early Christian traditions. He was the son of Mary of Jerusalem whose home became a meeting place for the

apostles. He is also the cousin of St. Barnabas a Levite and a Cypriot. Mark also held a close relationship with St. Peter and was not one of the twelve apostles. St. Mark lived for years in Alexandria, where he died as a martyr while being dragged through the streets. In 828, relics of St. Mark were stolen from Alexandria and taken to Venice, Italy. There they are enshrined in a beautiful cathedral dedicated to the saint. St. Mark's symbol is a winged lion.

Feast Day: April 26



St Peter Chanel was born in 1803 in France. After ordination to the priesthood, he desired to become a missionary. He was assigned to his hometown. Finally in 1836, he led a small group of missionaries to the New Hebrides in the South Pacific. After a few years of converting the natives, the jealous island king had Peter killed.

However, within 5 months of his death, the entire island had been converted to Christianity.

Feast Day: April 28



St Catherine of Siena was born in 1347. In her childhood she consecrated her virginity to God and she had mystical experiences, seeing guardian angels of others. At 18 she became a Dominican. She devoted herself heroically to the care of the infected. She was one of the most brilliant theological minds of her day. She continued to

have visions of Christ, Mary and the Saints. She was given the Stigmata which became visible after he death. Catherine's letters are considered the most brilliant writings in the history of the Catholic Church. The life of the Saint who had been glorified by God with wonderous gifts and miracles was brought to a close on 29th April, 1380 at the age of 33. She was canonised in 1461 by Pope Pius II. In 1970 Pope Paul VI declared her a doctor of the Church.
