Pentecost Sunday (Year B) 22nd & 23rd May, 2021

Pentecost

There is a young boy who loves to play with the TV remote control. To annoy his brothers and sisters, he keeps changing channels when they are watching television, until they decided to take the battery out of the remote control. The young boy quickly gets bored because the remote control no longer works, he then abandons his toy. The remote control is useless without its battery (internal

Before Pentecost, the disciples of Jesus were looking for an external victory. They wanted Jesus to drive out the Roman occupying power and take over political supremacy. They had been hampered by their vision of a powerful Messiah who would fulfil their ambition with victories and easy promotion. All they could see was external. Jesus' death as a criminal had shattered their false expectations and only after Jesus resurrected, they discovered the meaning of their mission again. Jesus ascended into heaven after he promised his disciples the Holy Spirit will come to them. "The Holy Spirit that the Father will send in my name - he will teach you everything and remind you of all that I told you" (Jn 14:26).

At Pentecost the disciples were able to see the real Jesus and the real message that had been there all the time. They became aware that the power was coming from within, that the message of Christ was about internal attitude, it was about uniting and removing barriers of language and race and domination. It was significant that they immediately began to reach beyond barriers. Language, culture and differences were no longer a block but the sources of enriching the gift of unity in diversity.

Pentecost Sunday, the birthday of the church challenges us to overcome all barriers which prevent us from reaching out to share with others the fruit of the Spirit in us: "love, joy, peace patience, kindness, generosity, faithfulness, gentleness, self control" (Gal 5:22). May we become the sharers of these gifts and be the witnesses of the presence of the risen Lord.

Catechism of the Catholic Church

1076 - The church was made manifest to the world on the day of Pentecost by the outpouring of the Holy Spirit. The gift of the Spirit ushers in a new era in the 'dispensation of the mystery'- the age of the church, during which Christ manifests, makes present and communicates his work of salvation through the liturgy of his church, 'until he comes'.

Grace is one way Catholics describe the action of God in the world. God, through the Holy Spirit, is active in all creation. When we pray, serve others or participate in the sacraments, we share in God's life. Grace is the gift that helps us know God better, become stronger in faith and live a just life.

Catholics speak about two major kinds of grace, sanctifying grace and actual grace. Baptism takes away original sin and makes us a new creation. The action of the Holy Spirit in sanctifying grace makes us holy by giving us a share in God's life. Sanctifying grace is restored or strengthened when we received the other six sacraments. Actual grace helps us to know and do what is right at a particular time. It is a temporary action of the Holy Spirit.

NSW Restrictions for Churches due to Covid-19

St. Joseph: A beloved father

The greatness of Saint Joseph is that he was the spouse of Mary and the father of Jesus. In this way, he placed himself, in the words of Saint John Chrysostom, "at the service of the entire plan of salvation". St Paul VI pointed out that Joseph concretely expressed his fatherhood "by making his life a sacrificial service to the mystery of the incarnation and its redemptive purpose. He employed his legal authority over the Holy Family to devote himself completely to them in his life and work. He turned his human vocation to domestic love into a superhuman oblation of himself, his heart and all his abilities, a love placed at the service of the Messiah who was growing to maturity in his home".

Thanks to his role in salvation history, Saint Joseph has always been venerated as a father by the Christian people. This is shown by the countless churches dedicated to him worldwide, the numerous religious Institutes, Confraternities and ecclesial groups inspired by his spirituality and bearing his name, and the many traditional expressions of piety in his honour. Innumerable holy men and women were passionately devoted to him. Among them was Teresa of Avila, who chose him as her advocate and intercessor, had frequent recourse to him and received whatever graces she asked of him. Encouraged by

Feasts of the Week



Our Lady Help of Christians

The Virgin Mary has often been invoked in times of religious strife under the title of Help of Christians. In thanksgiving for the release of Pope Pius VII from captivity in 1814, the feast was established the following year on the anniversary of his restoration.

The first Australian provincial synod held in Sydney in 1844 placed the Church in Australia under Mary's patronage invoked by the title Help of Christians. The solemn feast is an occasion to seek Mary's help and protection for our Church and nation.

Feast Day: 24th May



St. Bede the Venerable

Born in Jarrow, United Kingdom, Bede is one of the few saints honored as such even during his lifetime. His writings were filled with such faith and learning. Though his History is the greatest legacy Bede has left us, his work in all the sciences, especially in Scripture,

should not be overlooked. During his last Lent, Bede worked on a translation of the Gospel of Saint John into English, completing it the day he died in 735.

Feast Day: 25th May



St. Mary Magdalene de' Pazzi

Born in Florence, Italy, 1566, Mary Magdalene de' Pazzi was so generously given this special gift of God that she is called the "ecstatic saint." Mystical ecstasy is the elevation of the spirit to God in such a way that the person is aware of this union with God while both

internal and external senses are detached from the sensible world. She read the thoughts of others and predicted future events. During her lifetime, Mary Magdalene appeared to several persons in distant places and cured a number of sick people.

Feast Day: 25th May



St. Philip Neri

Born in Florence (Italy) in 1515. An outstanding proponent of Church reform after the Council of Trent. Worked among the young and the poor in Rome and founded the Congregation of the Oratory. Many people wrongly feel that such an attractive and jocular

personality as Philip's cannot be combined with an intense spirituality. Philip's life melts our rigid, narrow views of piety. His approach to sanctity was truly catholic, all-embracing, and accompanied by a good laugh. Remembered as a spiritual director, for his pastoral initiatives, and for his humour, simplicity, and charity. Died at Rome on this day in 1595.

Feast Day: 26th May



St. Augustine of Canterbury

In the year 596, some 40 monks set out from Rome to evangelize the Anglo-Saxons in England. Leading the group was Augustine, the prior of their monastery. Work was sometimes slow and Augustine did not always meet with success. Attempts to

reconcile the Anglo-Saxon Christians with the original Briton Christians who had been driven into western England by Anglo-Saxon invaders ended in dismal failure. The limited success Augustine achieved in England before his death in 605, a short eight years after his arrival, would eventually bear fruit long after in the conversion of England. Augustine of Canterbury can truly be called the "Apostle of England."

Feast Day: 27th May



St. Paul V

Born near Brescia in northern Italy, he reigned as Pope from 1963 to 1978. Pope Saint Paul's greatest accomplishment was the completion and implementation of Vatican II. Its decisions about liturgy were the first ones

noticed by most Catholics, but its other documents especially the ones about ecumenism, interfaith relations, divine revelation, religious liberty, the Church's self-understanding and the Church's work with the entire human family — have become the Catholic Church's road map since 1965.

First reading A reading from the Acts of the Apostles

When Pentecost day came round, they had all met in one room, when suddenly they heard what sounded like a powerful wind from heaven, the noise of which filled the entire house in which they were sitting; and something appeared to them that seemed like tongues of fire; these separated and came to rest on the head of each of them. They were all filled with the Holy Spirit, and began to speak foreign languages as the Spirit gave them the gift of speech.

Now there were devout men living in Jerusalem from every nation under heaven, and at this sound they all assembled, each one bewildered to hear these men speaking his own language. They were amazed and astonished. 'Surely' they said 'all these men speaking are Galileans? How does it happen that each of us hears them in his own native language? Parthians, Medes and Elamites; people from Mesopotamia, Judaea and Cappadocia, Pontus and Asia, Phrygia and Pamphylia, Egypt and the parts of Libya round Cyrene; as well as visitors from Rome – Jews and proselytes alike – Cretans and Arabs; we hear them preaching in our own language about the marvels of God.'

Second reading Galatians 5:16-25 A reading from the letter of St Paul to the Galatians

If you are guided by the Spirit you will be in no danger of yielding to self-indulgence, since self-indulgence is the opposite of the Spirit, the Spirit is totally against such a thing, and it is precisely because the two are so opposed that you

do not always carry out your good intentions. If you are led by the Spirit, no law can touch you. When self-indulgence is at work the results are obvious: fornication, gross indecency and sexual irresponsibility; idolatry and sorcery; feuds and wrangling, jealousy, bad temper and quarrels; disagreements, factions, envy; drunkenness, orgies and similar things. I warn you now, as I warned you before: those who behave like this will not inherit the kingdom of God. What the Spirit brings is very different: love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, goodness, trustfulness, gentleness and self-control. There can be no law against things like that, of course. You cannot belong to Christ Jesus unless you crucify all self-indulgent passions and desires.

Since the Spirit is our life, let us be directed by the Spirit.
