The Word of God

The owner of a large business bought a number of signs reading "**DO IT NOW!**" and had them hung around his office, hoping to inspire his employees with promptness and energy in their work. One day soon afterward, a friend asked him how the sign had affected his staff. "Well, not the way I expected," the business man answered, "The bursar skipped with \$100,000; the supervisor ran away with my private secretary; and all the staff asked for a raise."

In today's Gospel, Jesus invites us to read and interpret the 'signs' and the 'end of time'. The matter of the end for each of us and the 'end' of the world itself is one that is often mentioned in the Bible. In our Christian understanding the 'end of time' had been anticipated in the death and resurrection of Jesus. In Jesus, our salvation has already been achieved but we are not yet fully enjoying it. Mark underlines the passion of Jesus Christ who is proclaimed as the Son of God not so much for his authority and miraculous power but for his obedience to the will of God. The followers of Christ bear witness to their faith by continuing Jesus' mission. It is by remaining faithful to the end that they will be saved and fully rejoiced.

Furthermore, the message of Jesus is not the disaster that happens but the new life that begins. Jesus talked about the coming reign of God. Mark's writing aims not to strike fear into people but rather to inspire them with hope. He points to the fig tree: in winter it sheds off its branches and looks dead. But when winter is past: "Its twigs grow supple and its leaves come out." Jesus' message is one of hope to be found in the world as it is. It is a message that tells us that God is journeying with us in the trials and difficulties of life, and that His word is ever present to shine the light of hope on our paths. By contemplating on Jesus' word we certainly find joy, strength and hope even when we have to face the challenges and problems in our daily life because we know that "heaven and earth will pass away, but my words will not pass away."

Let us pray that Jesus' words will continue to inspire us, guide us, and give us hope and comfort, as we continue to live our faith and carry on Jesus' mission in our daily life.

THE SACRAMENT OF CONFIRMATION

265. What place does Confirmation have in the divine plan of salvation?

In the Old Testament the prophets announced that the Spirit of the Lord would rest on the awaited Messiah and on the entire messianic people. The whole life and mission of Jesus were carried out in total communion with the Holy Spirit. The apostles received the Holy Spirit at Pentecost and proclaimed the great works of God" (*Acts* 2:11). They gave the gift of the same Spirit to the newly baptised by the laying on of hands. Down through the centuries, the Church as continued to live by the Spirit and to impart him to her children.

266. Why is this sacrament called *Chrismation or Confirmation?*

It is called *Chrismation* (in the Eastern Churches: Anointing with holy myron or chrism) because the essential rite of the sacrament is anointing with chrism. It is called *Confirmation* because it confirms and strengthens baptismal grace.

267. What is the essential rite of Confirmation?

The essential rite of Confirmation is the anointing with Sacred Chrism (oil mixed with balsam and consecrated by the bishop), which is done by the laying on of the hand of the minister who pronounces the sacramental words proper to the rite. In the West this anointing is done on the forehead of the baptised with the words, "Be sealed with the gift of the Holy Spirit". In the Eastern Churches of the Byzanite rite this anointing is also done on other parts of the body with the words, "The seal of the gift of the Holy Spirit".

Feasts of the Week



St Albert the Great

Albert was born is Swabia - a region that now contains Stuttgart, Germany around 1200. He studied at the Universities of Padua and Paris, which then was the intellectual centre of western Europe. He joined the Dominican Order and became the first German

Dominican friar to receive a master of theology degree. Albert became one of the great scholars of his age. He led the way introducing the writings of Aristotle to Western thought. He pioneered the use of the inductive method of reasoning. Albert was also a renowned scholar and researcher in natural sciences studying animals, bird, insects, plants and minerals. His 40 volumes of writings served as an encyclopedia of human knowledge at the time in physics, geography, astronomy, mineralogy, chemistry, biology, mathematics, scripture, philosophy and theology. His contemporaries called him "Albert the Great" ("Albertus Magnus") and "universal doctor". Thomas Aquinas was his pupil in Cologne, who would also become a doctor of the Church and a saint. Albert preached throughout the German and Bohemian regions, becoming one of the most famous preachers of western Europe. In 1256, he became papal theologian in Rome. Many of his writings focused on Mary, Mother of Jesus. He died in 1280. In 1931, Pope Pius XI proclaimed him a saint and doctor of the church. In 1941, Pope Pius XII proclaimed him patron saint of all natural scientists.

Feast Day: November 15



St Margaret of Scotland, or Margaret of Wessex, was an English princess born in Hungary to Princess Agatha of Hungary and English Prince Edward the Exile around 1045. Margaret's family

fled from William the Conqueror after his victory at the Battle of Hastings in 1066. Her widowed mother set out to take her children north to Northumbria. She married King Malcom and became Queen. She was well-known for her deep life of prayer and piety. She had new churches built and she promoted the arts and education in Scotland. She encouraged Church synods and was involved in efforts to correct the religious abuses involving Bishops, priests and laypeople. Her impact in Scotland led her to being referred to as, "The Pearl of Scotland." Margaret passed away four days after her husband, on November 16, 1093. In 1250, Pope Innocent IV canonized Margaret as a Saint, acknowledging her life of holiness and extraordinary virtue. She was honoured for her work for reform of the Church and her personal holiness. Feast Day: November 16



St Gertrude was born in Eiselben in Saxony. At the age of 5, she was placed in the care of the Benedictine Nuns and later became a nun in the same order. She enjoyed a good education and wrote and composed in Latin. She died in 1302. Feast Day: November 16



St Elizabeth of Hungary was born in Hungary in 1207. The daughter of the King of Hungary. Elizabeth chose a life of penance and asceticism when a life of leisure and luxury could easily have been hers. This choice endeared her in the hearts of the common people throughout Europe. At the age of 14, she married

Louis of Thuringia, whom she deeply loved. They had three children. Under the spiritual direction of a Franciscan friar, she led a life of prayer, sacrifice, and service to the poor and sick. Seeking to become one with the poor, she wore simple clothing. Daily she would take bread to hundreds of the poorest in the land who came to her gate. After six years of marriage, her husband died in the Crusades, and Elizabeth was grief-stricken. Her husbands family looked upon her as squandering the royal purse, and mistreated her, finally throwing her our of the palace. The return of her husband's allies from the Crusades resulted in her being reinstated, since her son was legal heir to the throne. In 1228, Elizabeth joined the Secular Franciscan Order, spending the remaining few years of her life caring for the poor in a hospital which she founded in honour of St Francis of Assisi. Elizabeth's health declined, and she died before her 24th birthday in 1231. Her great popularity resulted in her canonization four years later. Feast Day: November 17

All the priests stand at their duties every day, offering over and over again the same sacrifices which are quite incapable of taking sins away.
