The Lord is coming

Last week, we ended one liturgical year - year B and today the Church begins with a new liturgical year - year C with the first Sunday of Advent. The new liturgical year starts a new cycle of prayers and scriptural readings.

Derived from a Latin root, Advent means 'coming' or 'arrival'. It is traditionally a season of quiet and joyful expectancy. During the season of Advent, liturgical vestments are violet. Four weeks of Advent calls us to prepare for Christmas coming with special devotion as we prayerfully wait in hope for the coming of the Son of God, Jesus Christ. This is a wonderful time for us to prepare ourselves spiritually to welcome Baby Jesus into our lives, our families by following Jesus' advice "Stay awake, praying at all times for the strength to survive all that is going to happen."

"Advent" also refers to the Lord's coming in glory at the end of time. Pope John Paul II noted that the calculation of the passing years begins almost everywhere with Christ's coming into the world: this is the sign that the birth of Jesus has an unparalleled effect on the history of humankind. This week-end in the third Gospel, Luke describes the Glory Coming of Christ and tells us to prepare to stand before the Son of Man. It will be the time of fright for those who live unprepared, but of joy and happiness for the meek and humble who live in God's ways. "Men will die of fright in anticipation of what is coming upon the earth." But those who live in God's way will "stand up straight and raise your heads, for your salvation is near at hand."

This is a season for prophecy, calling us to conversion, preparation and a constant sense of watchfulness. It calls us to have hope and believe that history continues open to the plan of God and to human creativity.

Our preparation for the Coming of Jesus Christ is to acknowledge God's presence in all paths of life. It is important for us to reflect on the purpose of our lives and our relationship with God and with other people, here and now. Let's pray that we will continue to be the source of hope, joy and peace for others whom we meet in everyday life.

Catechism of the Catholic Church

524 When the church celebrates the liturgy of Advent each year, she makes present this ancient expectancy of the Messiah, for by sharing in the long preparation for the Saviour's first coming, the faithful renew their ardent desire for his second coming. By celebrating the precursor's birth and martyrdom, the church unites her-

self to his desire: 'He must increase, but I must decrease.'



Through the ages you strengthened your people with the promise of your reign of justice and love. This advent, light in our hearts your renewing hope So that we might be a light to others. We ask this in the name of Christ our Lord, Amen.

As we embark on our catechetical journey for 2022, this word proclaims and declares that YOU have been CHOSEN for this time and season to bring Christ to the little ones. I must acknowledge our 60 catechist/ helpers who teach over 1100 primary school students in 6 of our local public schools. We recognise their response to their baptismal call to evangelise, their generosity in volunteering, their commitment to half hour teaching every week and their love for the children in a mission which is often unseen and unrecognized yet crucial and rewarding.

We congratulate the following catechists who will receive these awards at St Mary's Cathedral on Sunday 30th January for their years of dedicated service **20 years** – Mrs Vicki Scutella, **25 years** Mrs Nadia Pospischil and Mrs Trudi Simpson.

Due to the Covid situation last year and this year many of our scripture classes were cancelled and the students have missed out on almost a year of scripture. Feasts of the Week



St Andrew, also known as Andrew the Apostle, was a Christian Apostle and the older brother to St. Peter. According to the New Testament, Andrew was born in the village of Bethsaida on the Sea of Galilee during the early first century. Much like his younger brother, Simon Peter, Andrew was also a fisherman.

Andrew's very name means strong and he was known for having good social skills. It is believed Andrew was one of the closer disciples to Jesus. It was he who told Jesus about the boy with the loaves and fishes. Andrew was also present at the last supper. Andrew went on to preach the Good News around the shores of the Black Sea and throughout what is now Greece and Turkey. Andrew was martyred by crucifixion in Patras. He was bound, rather than nailed, to a cross, as is described in the Acts of Andrew. He was crucified on a cross form known as "crux decussata," which is an X-shaped cross or a "saltire." Today this is commonly referred to as "St. Andrew's Cross." It is believed Andrew requested to be crucified this way, because he deemed himself "unworthy to be crucified on the same type of cross as Jesus." Andrew's remains were originally preserved at Patras. However, some believe St. Regulus, who was a monk at Patras, received a vision telling him to hide some of Andrew's bones. Shortly after Regulus' dream, many of Andrew's relics were transferred to Constantinople by order of Roman emperor Constantius II around 357. Regulus later received orders in a second dream telling him to take the bones "to the ends of the earth." He was to build a shrine for them wherever he shipwrecked. He landed on the coat of Fife, Scotland. In September 1964, Pope Paul VI had all of St. Andrew's relics that ended up in Vatican City sent back to Patras. Now, many of Andrew's relics and the cross on which he was martyred are kept in the Church of St. Andrew in Patras. St. Andrew is venerated in Georgia as the first preacher of Christianity in that territory and in Cyprus for having struck the rocks creating a gush of healing waters upon landing on the shore. His saltire cross is featured on the flag of Scotland and is represented in much of his iconography. He is commonly portrayed as an old man with long white hair and a beard, often holding the Gospel book or a scroll.

Feast day: November 30



St Francis Xavier was a Navarrese-Basque Roman Catholic missionary born in the Kingdom of Navarre on April 7, 1506. He was sent to study at the University of Paris and in 1530, Francis Xavier earned his master's degree, and went on to teach philosophy at the University of Paris. On August

15, 1534, Francis Xavier along with Peter Favre, and several other friends, made vows of poverty, chastity, and obedience. The men planned to travel to the Holy Land to convert non-believers. Francis Xavier started his study of theology that same year and was ordained on June 24, 1537. With St Ignatius Loyola became one of the seven who founded the Society of Jesuits. He preached for 6 months in Africa on his way to Asia where he spent the remainder of his life spreading the Word of God in India, Japan and the Philippines.
