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The Epiphany of the Lord (Year C) 1st & 2nd January, 2022

God's Revelation

John, an avid golfer, came home from the golf course one Saturday. His wife, Mary asked him with whom he had played that day. He said, "Oh, no one in particular." She asked, "Why don't you play with Bill anymore?" John replied, "Would you like to play golf with someone who throws his clubs, swears all the time, lies about his scores and won't stop talking while your trying to play a shot?" "Of course not!" Mary protested. "Neither does Bill." John replied.

This weekend we celebrate the Feast of the Epiphany of the Lord. The word Epiphany comes from the Greek 'epiphancia', meaning 'manifestation'. After Christmas, we continue to ponder at the revelation of God to the world in Jesus Christ. The Feast of the Epiphany symbolises 'the baby born to be King' will rule not by force but by love, reigning not from a throne but from a cross.

The Gospel gives us a wonderful picture of the wise men who were searchers for the truth. They left their homeland and their families to follow the star to discover the birth of God's Son in Bethlehem. The significance of this from the scriptural point of view is that Christ came for **all** people including the non-Jews. From our point of view the story shows the wise men as people who yearn for the truth by reaching out to seek for it. They were free and flexible. How different they were to Herod who resorted to lies and murder when his plan failed? Like the wise men we are called to search for the truth which sets us free, i.e. constantly seeking for God in prayers, in the way we live our life.

Let us pray that like the wise men who were able to see and recognise that infant Jesus as the Christ, the promised Messiah, may we be able to recognise Jesus who "will be with us 'till the end of the world' and make Him present to others.

Catechism of the Catholic Church

528 *The Epiphany* is the manifestation of Jesus as Messiah of Israel, Son of God and Saviour of the world... In the magi, representatives of the neighbouring pagan religions, the gospel sees the first-fruits of the nations, who welcome the good news of salvation through the incarnation. the magi's coming to Jerusalem in order to pay homage to the king of the Jews shows that they seek in Israel, in the messianic light of the star of David, the one who will be king of the nations.

The Epiphany of the Lord. Solemnity, 2nd January

Today the Church celebrates the Solemnity of the Epiphany. "The Lord and ruler is coming; kingship is his, and government and power." With these words the Church proclaims that today's feast brings to a perfect fulfillment all the purposes of Advent.

Epiphany, therefore, marks the liturgical zenith of the Advent-Christmas season. — *Pius Parsch*

The Solemnity of the Epiphany is celebrated either on January 6 or, according to the decision of the episcopal conference, on the Sunday between January 2 and January 8. The young Messiah is revealed as the light of the nations. Yet, as the antiphon for the *Magnificat* at Second Vespers reminds us,



three mysteries are encompassed in this solemnity: the adoration of the Christ Child by the Magi, the Baptism of Christ and the wedding feast at Cana. Extra candles and/or lamps may be placed around the sanctuary and in other parts of the church to honor Christ revealed as the Light of the Gentiles (*Ceremonial of Bishops*). It is customary to replace the images of the shepherds at the crib with the three Magi and their gifts.

I must acknowledge our 60 catechist/ helpers who teach over 1100 primary school students in 6 of our local public schools. We recognise their response to their baptismal call to evangelise, their generosity in volunteering, their commitment to half hour teaching every week and their love for the children in a mission which is often unseen and unrecognized yet crucial and rewarding.

Due to the Covid situation last year and this year many of our scripture classes were cancelled and the students have missed out on almost a year of scripture. 



The Context of the Synoptic Gospels: the Gospel of Luke

The author of the Gospel of Luke is thought to have been a Syrian, from the city of Antioch, who was a physician and friend and fellow traveller of St Paul named Luke. His gospel may have been written around the time of the destruction of the Jewish Temple, between AD 65 and 80. It is almost impossible to know where it was written, but scholars have suggested one of the cities in Greece, perhaps Corinth. Luke is clearly writing for Gentile Christians. The person to whom his gospel is addressed has a Greek name, Theophilus, and he declares throughout the gospel that the salvation of Christ is offered to non-Jews. The author is clearly deeply influenced by the OT, even though he seldom quotes it directly. Luke is writing in a period of great expansion for the infant Church. The early Christians have accepted that the Second Coming of Christ may not occur for a long time, and they have learned to concentrate on issues of day-to-day Christian life, work, Christian love and prayer. The most important theme of Luke's gospel is that Jesus is Saviour for all, Gentiles, outcasts and sinners alike.

Feasts of the Week



St Raymond of Penyafort

St. Raymond was a relative of the King of Aragon. From childhood he had a tender love and devotion to the Blessed Mother. He finished his studies at an early age, and became a famous teacher. He then gave up all his honours and entered the Order of the Dominicans.

St. Raymond was very humble and very close to God. He did much penance and was so good and kind that he won many sinners to God. With King James of Aragon and St. Peter Nolasco he founded the Order of Our Lady of Ransom. The brave religious of this Order devoted themselves to saving poor Christians captured by the Moors. Once he went with King James to the Island of Majorca to preach about Jesus. King James was a man of great qualities, but he let himself be ruled by passions. There on the Island, too, he was giving bad example. The Saint commanded him to send the woman away. The King said he would, but he did not keep his promise. So St. Raymond decided to leave the Island. The King declared he would punish any ship captain who brought the Saint back to Barcelona. Putting all his trust in God, Saint Raymond spread his cloak upon the water, tied up one corner of it to a stick for a sail, made the Sign of the Cross, stepped onto the cloak, and sailed along for six hours until he reached Barcelona. This miracle moved the King. He was sorry for what he had done, and he became a true follower of St. Raymond. St. Raymond was one hundred years old at the time of his death.

Gospel Matthew 2:1-12 A reading from the Holy Gospel according to Matthew

Matthew 2:2

After Jesus had been born at Bethlehem in Judaea during the reign of King Herod, some wise men came to Jerusalem from the east. 'Where is the infant king of the Jews?' they asked. 'We saw his star as it rose and have come to do him homage.' When King Herod heard this he was perturbed, and so was the whole of Jerusalem. He called together all the chief priests and the scribes of the people, and enquired of them where the Christ was to be born. 'At Bethlehem in Judaea,' they told him 'for this is what the prophet wrote:

And you, Bethlehem, in the land of Judah, you are by no means least among the leaders of Judah, for out of you will come a leader who will shepherd my people Israel.'

Then Herod summoned the wise men to see him privately. He asked them the exact date on which the star had appeared, and sent them on to Bethlehem. 'Go and find out all about the child,' he said 'and when you have found him, let me know, so that I too may go and do him homage.' Having listened to what the king had to say, they set out. And there in front of them was the star they had seen rising; it went forward, and halted over the place where the child was. The sight of the star filled them with delight, and going into the

house they saw the child with his mother Mary, and falling to their knees they did him homage. Then, opening their treasures, they offered him gifts of gold and frankincense and myrrh. But they were warned in a dream not to go back to Herod, and returned to their own country by a different way.
