# GOD'S PRESENCE IN MARRIAGE

One of the greatest wedding feasts ever recorded in the history of mankind was the wedding of Alexander the Great and princess Roxanne of Iraq in the 4th century BC. The feast lasted seven days and nights, everyone in the empire was commanded to celebrate and be merry; Alexander also organised sport competitions and I guess the Olympics began from there.

In every wedding feast the bride and groom are always the central focus, but the wedding of Cana tells us a good deal about Mary and the role she played 'the mother of Jesus was there... when they ran out of wine... the mother of Jesus said to him, "They have no wine." She informed her Son that the wine had run out. She knows that it would be very embarrassing for the hosts and the newly wedded couple. Mary appears to be a considerate, caring and warm Jewish woman, who loves to help when others are in need. She tells the servants to put their trust in Jesus, "Do whatever he tells you." Even after Jesus apparently turns down her request, "My hour has not come yet," Mary's faith remains firm and solid. Mary's prayer is effective with God because hers is a Mother's prayer and Jesus has immense love for his mother. The wedding feast was blessed when the couple invited Mary as their guest, and Our Lady acted as an intercessor even without being asked. I wonder what would she do if we asked her to intervene for us?

Let us pray that through the Good News today we can recognise Mary's love for us; she will intercede for us when we are in need, and if we invite her and Jesus into our home as guests we will certainly experience God's love and have life in abundance.

## Catechism of the Catholic church

1613 On the threshold of his public life Jesus performs his first sign – at his mother's request – during a wedding feast. The church attaches great importance to Jesus' presence at the wedding at Cana. She sees in it the confirmation of the goodness of marriage and the proclamation that thenceforth marriage will be an efficacious sign of Christ's presence.

# **Scripture**

It must be said that Christ himself 'is present in his word, since it is he who speaks when Scripture is read in Church.' Indeed, 'the liturgical celebration becomes the continuing, complete and effective proclamation of God's word The word of God, constantly proclaimed in the liturgy, is always a living and effectively word through the power of the Holy Spirit. It expresses the Father's love that never fails in its effectiveness towards us.' The Church has always realised that in the liturgical action the word of God is accompanied by the interior working of the Holy Spirit who makes it effective in the hearts of the faithful.

# **Vocation of marriage and family**

Christians understand marriage as a vocation. Like Baptism, marriage is a sacrament of service that calls people to a way of life, gives them the strength to live it well, and supports them to keep the promises they made to one another.

Most men and women are called to married life. They made life's journey not as "I", an individual, but as "we", a couple. They find meaning in life in the mutual loving relationship of marriage. At the same time, marriage is called to transmit the gift of human life, to have children and form a community of persons that is the basic living cell of society, in the family.

The complementary meaning of the difference between the two sexes, being a woman and being a man, is part of the divine plan for those who come together in marriage. This is why the word 'marriage' is used only to describe this unique bond between persons of different sexes. Each is different and complementary, needing the other. For the Christian the phrase 'opposite sex', does not mean 'oppose to one another'. It is understood that man and woman are made for one another as each is distinct and different. The Christian tradition has always taught that woman and man find completion and fulfillment in one another.

Finding the right partner in marriage is a matter for prayer, discernment, patience and trust. It is a matter of waiting, of not demanding everything right now. Rushing into a relationship that could lead to marriage is unwise. People usually reflect carefully once they realise that the vocation to marriage is a call to a life-long commitment.

Marriage is permanent and binding. It is meant to be the sharing of two lives 'until death do us part'. It is a call to be faithful to each other, a fidelity that excludes sexual relationships with anyone outside the bond of marriage. So the commitment of marriage cannot merely be the decision of one individual. Marriage is a mutual and equal commitment of two persons, willing to work together in harmony, willing to live together as 'one flesh' and 'one body'.

The vocation to marriage is a call to form a new community, the family. Here a husband and wife find the great vocation of parenthood. For Christians, becoming a mother or father is a mission from God to raise and form children they have brought into the world. Once parents think of parenthood as a vocation, they understand that this is a serious responsibility.

They know it is also a great joy and privilege, for in the community of the family they pass on to their children the gift of the faith and the heritage of Christian life.

For Catholics, the Christian family is important. The Second Vatican Council taught: 'in what might be regarded as the domestic church, the parents, by word and example, are the first heralds of the faith with regard to their children.' (Lumen gentium,11). In the family, children become aware that life is a vocation with meaning and purpose.

# reasts of the Weer



St Anthony the Abbot was born in Egypt in the 3rd century AD. Following the death of his parents when he was about 20, Anthony insured that his sister completed her education, then he sold his house, furniture, and the land he owned and gave the proceeds to the poor. He was a very spiritual person who believed in living the Jesus life. He became a

hermit and lived alone. When people eventually found him, he moved even further away, eating only bread and water, praying, fasting and wearing skins as clothing. Wise men from as far away as Greece sought his guidance. Some were healed physically, many were comforted by his words and others stayed to learn from him. He founded two monasteries on the Nile. He lived until 105 years of age, becoming the most famous monk of ancient Christendom, a noble example of an ascetic life of austerity, sacrifice and extreme solitude.

Feast Day: January 17



St Fabian Pope Fabian born in 200AD in Rome, Italy. He was the bishop of Rome from 10 January 236 to his death on 20 January 250. He is famous for the miraculous nature of his election, in which a dove is said to have descended on his head to mark him as the Holy Spirit's unexpected choice to become the next

pope. Being reminded of the Baptism of our Lord, the council elected Fabian Pope.

Feast Day: January 20



St Sebastian was born in Narbonne, France in 256AD. He was a captain in the Praetorian Guard. An early Christian saint and martyr, he was sentenced to die via bow and arrow for being a Christian. Left for dead he eventually healed only to be martyred again by the emperor, beaten to death by clubs and thrown into the

sewers. His body was recovered by a Christian woman, named Lucina, and she secretly buried him in the catacombs beneath Rome. Nearly 80 years after his death, around 367, his remains were moved to a basilica in Rome. His body, or at least some relics from his body were reportedly removed and shared with a community of monks in France. His cranium was sent to a German monastery where it was placed in a special silver case in 934. The relics remains in its case today in a special reliquary in Ebersberg.

Feast Day: January 20



St Agnes of Rome was born in 291 AD and raised in a Christian family. Agnes was very beautiful and belonged to a wealthy family. Her hand in marriage was highly sought after. However, Agnes made a promise to God never to stain her purity. Her love for the Lord was great and she hated sin even more than death! Because Agnes refused to marry, she was sentenced to death.

She died a virgin-martyr at the age of 12 or 13 on 21 January, 304. She is one of seven women who, along with the Blessed Virgin, are commemorated by name in the Canon of the Mass. Her emblem is a lamb.

Feast day: January 21



St Vincent Pallotti, Priest was born in Rome in 1795, St. Vincent became a priest and dedicated himself completely to God and cared for souls. He dreamed of gaining for Christ all non-Catholics, especially the Mohammedans. To this end he inaugurated a revolutionary program which envisaged the

collaboration of the laity in the apostolate of the clergy. But St. Vincent was also well aware of the many deprivations in the natural sphere that hindered the spread of the Faith. He thus obtained and spent huge sums for the poor and underprivileged. He founded guilds for workers, agriculture schools, loan associations, orphanages and homes for girls - all of which made him the pioneer and precursor of Catholic Action. His great legacy was the congregation which he founded for urban mission work, known as the "Society for Catholic Action". This indefatigable labourer for Christ died in 1850 from a severe cold which he most likely caught on a cold rainy night after giving his cloak to a beggar who had none.

### John 2:1-11 Gospel A reading from the Holy Gospel according to John

There was a wedding at Cana in Galilee. The mother of Jesus was there, and Jesus and his disciples had also been invited. When they ran out of wine, since the wine provided for the wedding was all finished, the mother of Jesus said to him, 'They have no wine.' Jesus said 'Woman, why turn to me? My hour has not come yet.' His mother said to the servants, 'Do whatever he tells you.' There were six stone water jars standing there, meant for the ablutions that are customary among the Jews: each could hold twenty or thirty gallons. Jesus said to the servants, 'Fill the jars with water', and they filled them to the brim. 'Draw some out now' he told them 'and take it to the steward.' They did this; the steward tasted the water, and it had turned into wine. Having no idea where it came from - only the servants who had drawn the

water knew – the steward called the bridegroom and said; 'People generally serve the best wine first, and keep the cheaper sort till the guests have had plenty to drink; but you have kept the best wine till now.'

This was the first of the signs given by Jesus: it was given at Cana in Galilee. He let his glory be seen, and his disciples believed in him.

## The Gospel of the Lord



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
