Seeing with the eyes of the Spirit

A man visited an audiologist, he complained about his wife who seemed to have problem with hearing, but he just can't convince her to visit an audiologist. "how do I test to see how bad her hearing is?" "Well when you arrive home, just call out from garage if she does not respond then go inside the house call out again, if she does not respond, you come close within 3 meters then you will know how bad her hearing is." The man arrived home, from the garage he could smell some beautiful cooking from the kitchen he called out "Honey, what's for dinner? Hearing no response from the kitchen. He walked into the lounge room and again "Honey, what's for dinner?" Three seconds later, he didn't hear anything. He entered the kitchen, standing 3 meters from his wife, "Honey, what are you cooking for dinner?" "For God sake, this is the third time I said, it's Chicken Schnitzel!" said his wife.

We can be very subjective in seeing or judging others. In the Gospel's Jesus remands us: "a good man draws what is good from the store of goodness in his heart; a bad man draws what is bad from the store of badness. For a man's words flow out of what fills his heart."

We often see with the eyes of our hearts. We do not see things as they are but as we are. If there is joy and hope in our hearts, we will see joy and hope. If there is anger and hatred in our hearts, we will also see anger and hatred. Sadly, these patterns can be passed on from generation to generation.



Much of how we think, and act are conditioned by the prejudices and experience that we have inherited from our families. Much of what we do is following on the model set for us by our parents or any significant others in our earthly life. If we are living in an environment where people easily burst into anger when they are frustrated, we will probably do the same. Or if we live in a place where people are welcoming and cheerful then we probable act in the same way. It is a well-known fact that the children who are raised by drug addicted parents are the most likely will be drug addicted themselves. We often do to others what was done to us by people who had it done to them. Jesus raises an awareness that we often imprisoned ourselves by our own egotism or past experienced which can blind us from seeing the beauty and wonder in others. As the result we often misjudge others.

Let us pray that we can be free from the prejudices which distort our perceptions of reality so that we can rejoice in the wonder and beauty of God's creations.

Autumn Ember Day: March 4

Ember days have been kept in the Roman Church since the fifth century, and mark the beginning of each of the four seasons. Vatican Council II retained ember days in principle, but left it to

bishops conferences to determine the extent and form of their observance. (The name 'ember' is similar in derivation to the German Quatember, 'quarter day'; the Irish used to speak of Quarter Tense.) The Australian Catholic Bishops Conference has now decided that the Australian Church should observe the first Fridays of Autumn and Spring (March and September) as special days of prayer and penance.

On rogation and ember days the practice of the Church is to offer prayers to the Lord for the needs of all people, especially for the productivity of the earth and for human labour, and to give God public thanks (GNLYC 45).
