Love One Another

There was a couple who went to a marriage counsellor and complained about each other. The counsellor sat with them but both wanted to speak at the same time, so the marriage counsellor told them to write their complaints on a piece of paper instead of speaking aloud. The woman saw her husband took out his pen and started writing, so she quickly filled out her paper with her complaints. After one page the husband started on a second page, without hesitation she then filled out another page with her complaints. This went on for half an hour, then the marriage counsellor told them to stop and exchange their writings. The woman wanted to read her husband's writing first. When she started to read, her face turned pale and she began to cry because all he wrote was, "I love you! I love you! I love you! I love you!"..." in all the pages.

Today's gospel records Jesus' last message to his disciples to love one another, "I give you a new commandment: love one another; just as I have loved you, you also must love one another." Jesus shows forth the most important part of his teaching. Love is the essence of God. The Father loves the Son. This is the model for Jesus' love for us. This love is unconditional, self-emptying and endures trials and suffering for the sake of the beloved. It calls to give because its nature is to give all, without reservation.



As Jesus has said before, all that he speaks and does are the words and works of his Father. Likewise, the kind of love that he exhibits is the love of the Father for us. Our love in return must resemble Jesus' and must be expressed in fulfilling his commandment. Keeping Jesus' commandment is hard because it turns us inside out, having to relate to God and to one another from our hearts, from the core of our being. It calls us to reach out to love and serve others.

There are examples of Christ-like love in our modern time; such as Father Damian of Molokai, who spent his life among the lepers, caring for them, and contracted leprosy himself. Mother Teresa of Calcutta whom many people know about her dedication in caring for the poorest of the poor. Both father Damian and mother Teresa chose to love others no matter what the consequences may turn out to be. Their lives expressed "By this love you have for one another, everyone will know that you are my disciples." By loving one another we, as the disciples imitate the love of Jesus which we ourselves receive.

Let us pray that we can experience God's unconditional love for us so that in turn we will try harder to love others without expecting anything in return. May our love be big enough to accept people for who they are, created in the image of God

Do you remember....

3 August 1985

The first Parish 'Working Bee' was held in preparation for the opening and first Mass of the Church.

In the following story John and June Maher remember their early days in the Parish, including the Working Bees.

We moved from Cabramatta (where the parish priest at that time was Father Darcy O'Keefe) to a few acres at Kemps Creek in 1972. Parish boundaries were then somewhat vague, and we were advised that our location was a remote corner of South Mount Druitt Parish. As we would have had to pass either St Mary's or Horsley Park churches to reach South Mount Druitt, we initially attached ourselves to St Mary's Parish. However, because of transport considerations when Judy started school in 1975, we became parishioners of Mount Pritchard.

We first became aware of the proposed Bonnyrigg parish in a discussion with Father Ed Sedevic and Father Brian Lucas in the Mount Prichard Parish – this was in relation to the change of boundaries that would occur because of the new parish. In the course of ongoing discussions, we became aware that Father John Langtry would be the Parish Priest of Bonnyrigg and that construction of a new high school would begin almost immediately.

This was particularly relevant to us because I had known Father John in the early nineteen fifties and I knew he'd be a great parish priest, and also because Louise was due to enter a high school in 1985 – and Bonnyrigg showed great promise and was more convenient than other alternatives.

Despite some sadness at leaving the thriving Mount Prichard Parish, we joined John the Baptist within a couple of weeks of the first Mass celebrated there by Father John. I had dropped in to renew my acquaintance with Father John a week or so earlier and had found him surveying his new domain from the front verandah of the old homestead which had become the presbytery of the new parish. Built on timber piers, that house may have been comfortable, even semi-grand, in its heyday, but by 1985 it had deteriorated to the extent that it was certainly not the best option for the home of a new parish priest in a new parish.

Nevertheless, Father John adapted admirably to his new surroundings and made the old house quite welcoming for everyone. The kitchen was always good for a cuppa and a yarn or two, it provided the space needed for the planning of the new parish, and a small and intimate Blessed Sacrament Chapel occupied a room in one corner and was frequently visited.

The paddocks surrounding the presbytery have been the subject of much parish folklore, and many people will have their own recollections of the dilapidated chicken sheds, the tall weeds intertwined with broken fences, the land surface made uneven as a result of many past years of rural activity.

Many will also have their own recollections of the great response when the call went out for volunteers to help clear some of these problems – some brought tractors and trucks, others brought mowers and hand tools. There were tradesmen who gave freely of their time and expertise, and there were mums and dads and kids who just brought their bare hands and loads of energy. The spirit amongst the volunteers on these days was inspiring – it seemed that all wanted to be part of this new endeavour and all wanted to make it work. And Fr. John was right in the middle of it all, leading, cajoling, joking, and generally making it all work.

And there were many memorable milestones that occurred during these early days that further enhanced the great spirit that existed in the parish – new buildings were continually being started and completed for the high school, the arrival of the Sisters of Charity, the hall, the first Easter, Fr John's 25th anniversary, the beginning of the primary school, the new church, and the new presbytery (which was completed only after Fr John's sojourn of several months in a caravan on the site!).

Some of these events and the circumstances surrounding them

stand out in our memory. There is the picture of Fr John, in the middle of a bare paddock which became part of the high school, on the recliner chair presented to him on his 25th anniversary of ordination (1986). There is the arrival on a house-mover of the hall gifted to us by another parish, and the preparation and excitement leading up to the celebration of our first Mass in that hall after its installation. We remember the celebration of the first parish Easter amongst the earthworks surrounding the new hall and the erection of the old wooden cross on that occasion. And we remember the anticipation when the plans for the new church were put up on the wall in the hall for information and comment.

But apart from the milestones, we remember so many day to day activities and the people involved in them – the large number of children at Mass every week, the buzz that they (and everyone else) created in the Church, the occasional priestly admonitions for a bit less noise, Fr John's homilies and his ritual birthday greetings and joke at the end of each weekend Mass – the kids in particular loved those birthday greetings! There was the doorknocking done by the Sisters to invite Catholics to the Church, and the home-based first communion sacramental programme, both of which led to a renewal of faith for many

people. There were the multicultural days between the church and the primary school, and the special visits made by Cardinal Freeman at first and later by Cardinal Clancy.



Feasts of the Week



St. John 1 - Pope

A native of Tuscany in Italy, John was elected Pope while he was still an archdeacon upon the death of Pope Hormisdas in 523. What is known is that he succeeded in persuading the Emperor to mitigate his treatment of the Arians and thus avoid

reprisals against the Catholics in Italy. The Pope's visit also brought about the reconciliation of the Western and Eastern Churches.

Feast Day: May 18



St. Bernardine of Siena

A Franciscan friar and preacher, St. Bernardine is known as "the Apostle of Italy" for his efforts to revive the country's Catholic faith during the 15th century. He demonstrated a remarkable concern for the poor as an outgrowth of his love for God. He always travelled on foot, sometimes speaking

for hours in one place, then doing the same in another town. Feast Day: May 20



St. Christopher Magallanes and Companions

St. Christopher, along with 21 other priests and three lay companions, were martyred between 1915 and 1937, by shooting or hanging, throughout eight Mexican states. The last words heard spoken by Magallanes were from his cell,

when he shouted, "I am innocent and I die innocent. I forgive with all my heart those responsible for my death, and I ask God that the shedding of my blood serve the peace of our divided Mexico". Pope John Paul II beatified the Cristero martyrs in 1992 and canonized them in 2000.


