The Good Samaritan

Las Vegas for a holiday break. One evening A married couple went to Jane (the wife) went downstairs to play the poker machines while her husband was sleeping. She won one thousand dollars in coins. She decided to carry the whole bucket of coins to show her husband how lucky she is. The lift opened, Jane entered but immediately felt threatened when she saw two black American men already standing inside the lift, one skinny but the other was very big. She wanted to back out but the lift door had already closed. She turned her back to the men and tried to hide her money from their sight. Jane was thinking that they are going to rob her. Then Jane heard a voice saying "hit the ground!" Without thinking she fell on the floor while calling out "take the money but don't hurt me." She felt a very strong arm picking her up, the big man said to her "I'm sorry, I didn't mean to scare you, I told my friend to press the ground button". The men then escorted her to her room. Jane went inside still hearing the men's laughter along the corridor. The next morning there was a knock on the door, a man delivered a big bunch of flowers and a note saying "Thank you for a good laugh we hadn't had for a long time." signed Eddie Murphy and Michael Jordan.

The story of the Good Samaritan we read today in the Gospel tells us that true love cuts across all racial and cultural prejudice. The Samaritans were a despised people in those days. Jesus cuts through this prejudice by making the Samaritan the hero of his story. He even goes further, he identifies himself with the Samaritan. The way you treat the Samaritan becomes the way that you treat him, Christ. The lack of response from the priest and the Levite came from selfishness. What will happen to me if I get involved? Do I get anything out of this? Meanwhile the Samaritan's response was love; which came from the selfless self that put the welfare of the other before himself and in this way truly relate to God. What will happen to this man if I do not help?

Let us pray that our life be less concerned about what we can get from God and others but more about what we can give and share with others. May our prayer be a total openness to reality, a reality with God, who calls us to transcend ourselves.

Catechism of the Catholic Church

2447: the works of mercy are charitable actions by which we come to the aid of our neighbour in his spiritual and bodily necessities....The corporal works of mercy consist especially in feeding the hungry, sheltering the homeless, clothing the naked, visiting the sick and imprisoned, and burying the dead. Among all these, giving alms to the poor is one of the chief witnesses to fraternal charity: it is also a work of justice pleasing to God.

Our Lady of Mt Carmel

Sacred Scripture celebrated the beauty of Carmel where the prophet Elijah defended the purity of Israel's faith in the living God. In the twelfth century, hermits withdrew to that mountain and later founded the Carmelite order devoted to the contemplative life under the patronage of Mary, the holy Mother of God.

Devotion to Our Lady of Mount Carmel is worldwide, and most Catholics are familiar with the Scapular of Our Lady of Mount Carmel, also known as the Brown Scapular. Mary appeared to St. Simon Stock on July 16, 1251, and gave him the scapular with the following words, which are preserved in a fourteenth century narrative: "This will be for you and for all Carmelites the privilege, that he who dies in this will not suffer eternal fire." The feast of Our Lady of Mount Carmel was instituted for the Carmelites in 1332, and extended to the whole Church by Benedict XIII in 1726.

The Context of the Synoptic Gospels: the Gospel of Luke

The author of the Gospel of Luke is thought to have been a Syrian, from the city of Antioch, who was a physician and friend and fellow traveller of St Paul named Luked. His Gospel may have been written around the time of the destruction of the Jewish Temple, between AD 65 and 85. it is almost impossible to know where it was written, but Scholars have suggested one of the cities in Greece, perhaps Conrith. Luke is clearly writing for Gentile Christians. The person to whom his gospel is addressed has a Greek name, Theophilus, and he declares throughout the gospel that the salvation of Christ is offered to non-Jews. The author is clearly deeply influenced by the Old Testament, even though he seldom quotes it directly. Luke is writing in a period of great expansion for the infant Church. The early Christians have accepted that the Second Coming of Christ may not occur for a long time, and they have learned to concentrate on issues of day-to-day Christian life, work, Christian love and prayer. The most important theme of Luke's gospel is that Jesus is Saviour for all, Gentiles, outcasts and sinners alike.

Feasts of the Week



St Benedict was a mere teenager when he left the sinful world to live a life fasting and praying in the desert mountains. After years of prayer, word of his holiness brought nearby monks to ask for his leadership. He warned them he would be too strict for them, but they insisted. He set up twelve monasteries in Subiaco where

monks lived in separate communities of twelve. Benedict left these monasteries when envious attacks made it impossible to continue the spiritual leadership he had taken.

It was in Monte Cassino he founded the monastery that became the roots of the Church's monastic system. Instead of founding small separate communities he gathered his disciples into one whole community. His own sister, Saint Scholastica, settled nearby to live a religious life.

In Latin the meaning of the name Benedict is: blessed. From benedictus meaning blessed. Famous bearers: 6th-century Italian saint Benedict of Nursia founded the Benedictine order of monks and nuns.

Feast Day: July 11

Patron: Students and Europe



St Henry was born in 972. He received an excellent education under the care of St. Wolfgang, Bishop of Ratisbon. In 995, St. Henry succeeded his father as Duke of Bavaria, and in 1002, upon the death of his cousin, Otho III, he was elected emperor. Firmly anchored upon the great eternal truths, which the practice of meditation

kept alive in his heart, he was not elated by this dignity and sought in all things, the greater glory of God. He was most watchful over the welfare of the Church and exerted his zeal for the maintenance of ecclesiastical discipline through the instrumentality of the Bishops. He gained several victories over his enemies, both at home and abroad, but he used these with great moderation and clemency. In 1014, he went to Rome and received the imperial crown at the hands of Pope Benedict VIII.

The humility and spirit of justice of the Saint were equal this zeal for religion. Both he and his wife, St. Cunegundes, lived in perpetual chastity, to which they had bound themselves by vow. The Saint made numerous pious foundations, gave liberally to pious institutions and built the Cathedral of Bamberg. His holy death occurred at the castle of Grone, near Halberstad, in 1024.

Feast Day: July 13

Patron of the childless, of Dukes, of the handicapped and those rejected by Religious Order



St Bonaventure, bishop, doctor. Memorial.
Born at Bagnoregio (Italy) about 1218. Died at Lyons (France) on this day in 1274. He joined the Franciscans when studying in Paris and eventually became minister general of the order. Later appointed cardinal-bishop of Albano and died assisting Pope

Gregory X during the Council of Lyons. Known as the "Seraphic Doctor". Remembered as a teacher, for his extensive biblical and mystical writings, and for his holiness, gentleness, and compassion. Feast Day: July 15



A reading from the Holy Gospel according to Luke

There was a lawyer who, to disconcert Jesus, stood up and said to him, 'Master, what must I do to inherit eternal life?' He said to him, 'What is written in the Law? What do you read there?' He replied, 'You must love the Lord your God with all your heart, with all your soul, with all your strength, and with all your mind, and your neighbour as yourself.' 'You have answered right,' said Jesus 'do this and life is yours.'

But the man was anxious to justify himself and said to Jesus, 'And who is my neighbour?' Jesus replied, 'A man was once on his way down from Jerusalem to Jericho and fell into the hands of brigands; they took all he had, beat him and then made off, leaving him half dead. Now a priest happened to be travelling down the same road, but when he saw the man, he passed by on the other side. In the same way a Levite who came to the place saw him, and passed by on the other side. But a Samaritan traveller who came upon him was moved with compassion when he saw him. He went up and bandaged his wounds, pouring oil and wine on them. He then lifted him on to his own mount, carried him to the inn and looked after him. Next day, he took out two denarii and handed them to the innkeeper. "Look after him," he said "and on my way back I will make good any extra expense you have." Which of these three, do you think, proved himself a neighbour to the man who fell into the brigands' hands?' 'The one who took pity on him' he replied. Jesus said to him, 'Go, and do the same yourself.'
