Humility

In the car on his way to bless an opening of a new chapel, an elderly bishop was telling his young assistant seminarian, the story of his eventful life. He then turned to the young seminarian and asked him to tell the story of his vocation. "Oh, that's very simple told," he smugly replied. "All I can say is that the Lord had need of me." "That's a remarkable coincidence, young man," observed the bishop. "So far as I can remember, only once in the Gospels did the Lord ever say that He had need of anything. In **Lk** 19:34 on the occasion of his triumphal entry into Jerusalem. He said that he had need of an ass."

Today's gospel is one which we can experience everyday life. We often like to tell others that we are doing well and that we have many accomplishments, we think that God is expecting the same from us in our prayer. We live in a world where one has to present one's curriculum vitae and where one tries to make it look as impressive as possible. One tries to



be better than the rest of people even at the early age. This is precisely what the Pharisee did, he prayed to himself. God does not need to be impressed, but knows who we are already. What impressed God is not what we show ourselves to be, but the extent to which we know ourselves as we really are. "God, be merciful to me, a sinner."

The Pharisee made two mistakes; firstly he thought he can impress God by his boasting: "I thank you God, that I am not grasping, unjust, adulterous..." secondly he thought that he was better than others, particularly: "I am not like this tax collector." Madness or (abnormal) has been defined as having a sickness different to everyone else. Sanity is an awareness of who we are in relating to others. When we feel afraid or insecure we tend to show off our power and control, or even condemn others. Most of us have a neurotic compulsion which leads us to believe that when we put others down we will look better ourselves. But trying to put others down, to elevate ourselves, is a self-destroying waste of energy. It is like a nervous and bad swimmer who exerts enormous energy to keep head and shoulders above water. Confident swimmers will allow themselves to go under and allow just enough of themselves to appear above water so as to be able to breathe.

Let us pray for the gift of humility towards God and each other and may we always be truthful to ourselves.

The catechism of the Catholic Church

2559 'Prayer is the raising of one's mind and heart to God or the requesting of good things from God.' But when we pray, do we speak from the height of our pride and will, or 'out of the depths' of a humble and contrite heart? He who humble himself will be exalted: humility is the foundation of prayer. Only when we humbly acknowledge that 'we do not know how to pray as we ought' are we ready to receive freely the gift of prayer; 'Man is a beggar before God.'



Feasts of the Week



St Anthony Claret

Claretian archbishop and founder. Anthony was born in Salient in Catalonia, Spain, in 1807, the son of a weaver. He took up weaving but then studied for the priesthood, desiring to be a Jesuit. III health prevented his entering

the Order, and he served as a secular priest. In 1849, he founded the Missionary Sons of the Immaculate Heart of Mary, known today as the Claretians, and the Apostolic Training Institute of the Immaculate Conception, Claretian nuns. From 1850 to 1857, Anthony served as the archbishop of Santiago de Cuba, Cuba. He returned to the court of Queen Isabella II as confessor, and went into exile with her in 1868. In 1869 and 1870, Anthony participated in the First Vatican Council. He died in the Cistercian monastery of Fontfroide in southern France on October 24, 1870. Anthony Mary Claret had the gift of prophecy and performed many miracles. He was opposed by the liberal forces of Spain and Cuba and endured many trials.

Sts Simon and Jude



St. Simon the Apostle is often named St. Simon the Zealot, to distinguish him from St. Peter and St. Simeon. St. Simon was a Galilean, born at Cana in Galilee. He was called Simon the Zealot because of his great zeal to honour God and for purity of religion. The

Zealots during this time were known for assassinating the noble and filling the temple with bloodshed and profanities.

He was one of the original followers of Christ. After his conversion and his call, there is no further mention of him in the Gospels. He became zealous for Christ and for the duties of Christianity. After receiving the gifts of the Holy Spirit, he went out to evangelize with great zeal and fidelity. He was martyred by the idolatrous priests and many say that he was crucified. His relics are with St. Jude's in St. Peter's basilica and the Cathedral of Toulouse.



St Jude

St Jude, known as Thaddaeus was the brother of the apostle St James the Lesser and a relative of Our Lord, nephew to the Blessed Virgin Mary. He was also one of the Twelve, an Apostle of Jesus. One of the canonical epistles of the New Testament is attributed to St Jude, which has many common characteristics with the

second letter of St Peter. St. Jude (Thaddeus) is one of the most popular saints because of the numerous heavenly favours that he grants to his devotees who pray to him with faith, especially when seeking a job or a house. Ancient writers tell us that he preached the Gospel in Judea, Samaria, Idumaea, Syria, Mesopotamia, and Lybia. According to Eusebius, he returned to Jerusalem in the year 62, and assisted at the election of his brother, St. Simeon, as Bishop of Jerusalem. Saints Simon and Jude zealously preached to the nations and met with each other again in Persia. According to ancient tradition, they were martyred together - St. Simon was sawed in half and St. Jude was beheaded with an axe. Following his death, St. Jude's body was brought to Rome and left in a crypt in St. Peter's Basilica. Today his bones can be found in the left transept of St. Peter's Basilica under the main altar of St. Joseph in a tomb he shares with the remains of the apostle Simon the Zealot.
