

Acceptance

In his famous book 'Les Miserables' Victor Hugo portrays a young convicted man Jean Valjean who escaped from prison as a desperate man. He knocks on doors but no one receives him for he looks terrible. Bishop Myriel took him in the cathedral for the night. During the night, Jean stole some silver plates and ran away. The police suspected a poor looking man with expensive silver plates which were marked 'cathedral' so they caught him and brought him back to the bishop. "Your Grace, we caught this man with silver plates which belong to you." They excitedly reported. Bishop Myriel looked at Jean for one second and without hesitation he said, "I gave them to him and actually I have a few more silver candle holders to give him but he left so early." Jean Valjean was released, and from that moment his life changed completely.

Today we read in the book of Wisdom (11:23) "You overlook people's sins so that they can repent." This is exactly the way Jesus deals with Zacchaeus, who was an object of hatred and considered a traitor by his fellow Jews because he worked for the Roman oppressors as the head tax collector. Zacchaeus was a wealthy outcast. He lived a lonely and isolated life among his people. He just wanted to see Jesus whom he heard of as a prophet from Nazareth and of his reputation for compassion towards outcasts and sinners. The Gospel does



not say that Zacchaeus wants to meet Jesus (he's probably aware of his bad reputation). He got more than what he expected. Jesus overlooks his bad reputation but his need to be healed. Jesus takes the initiative and calls Zacchaeus by name" Zacchaeus, come down. Hurry, because I must stay at your house today." By entering Zacchaeus' house, Jesus gave back to him the dignity that he felt he had lost. Jesus freed him from the feeling of being the despised one.

In our daily living, we tend to exercise control over others by keeping them prisoners of their past mistakes. Many families and relationships have been broken because people refused to overlook the past wrong. We tend to demand repentance before we can start the process of reconciling, then we disappoint ourselves that reconciliation does not happen.

Let us pray that we can open ourselves to God's unconditional love and forgiveness. When we feel joyful at home within ourselves then we will be able to accept others, as Jesus accepts Zacchaeus and leads him to new life.

The Commemoration of All the Faithful Departed (All Souls Day)

All Souls Day is a holy day set aside for honouring the dead. The day is primarily celebrated in the Catholic Church, but it is also celebrated in the Eastern Orthodox Church and a few other denominations of Christianity.

According to Catholic belief, the soul of a person who dies can go to one of three places. The first is heaven, where a person who dies in a state of perfect grace and communion with God goes. The second is hell, where those who die in a state of mortal sin are naturally condemned by their choice. The intermediate option is purgatory, which is thought to be where most people, free of mortal sin, but still in a state of lesser (venial) sin, must go.

Purgatory is necessary so that souls can be cleansed and perfected before they enter into heaven. There is scriptural basis for this belief. The primary reference is in 2 Maccabees, 12:26 and 12:32. "Turning to supplication, they prayed that the sinful deed might be fully blotted out... Thus made atonement for the dead that they might be free from sin."

Feast Day: November 2



St Martin de Porres was born in Lima Peru on December 9, 1579. He was the illegitimate son to a Spanish gentleman and a freed slave from Panama. He was raised in poverty and bore the stigmas of both his illegitimate birth and his mixed race. He was placed to study with a barber-surgeon, where he learned bloodletting and the administration of medicines.

Compassionate and eager to serve, he began to volunteer with the Dominicans at age 15 and helped care for the sick in the monastery infirmary. He became a Dominican oblate, or lay monastic, in 1601. Although it was not customary then to receive a mulatto into a religious order in Peru, Martín was considered an exception and became a Dominican lay brother in 1610. He was noted for his work on behalf of the poor, establishing an orphanage and a children's hospital. He maintained an austere lifestyle, which included fasting and abstaining from meat. He was friends with St Rose of Lima. He died on 3rd November 1639 and many miracles were said to have occurred after his death.

Feast Day: November 3



St Charles Borromeo

Saint Charles Borromeo was born on October 2, 1538 at the castle of Arona on Lake Maggiore near Milan. He suffered from a speech impediment that made him appear slow to those who did not know him. Despite this challenge, he performed well at school. He earned a doctorate in canon and civil law in 1559. At the age

of 22 he was made Archbishop of Milan and became a Cardinal of the Church. Together with Saint Ignatius of Loyola and Saint Philip Neri and others, led the effort to fight the Protestant Reformation. He is credited with the founding of seminaries for the education of priests. He is also celebrated as a Saint of learning and the arts.


