Listen

American actor Jed Harris became convinced that he was losing his hearing. He went to a specialist who gave him a thorough check up. The doctor pulled out a gold timepiece and asked, "Can you hear this ticking?" "Of course," said Harris. The specialist walked to the door and held up the watch again. "Now can you hear it?" Harris concentrated and said, "Yes, I can hear it clearly." The doctor walked out of the door and into the next room and said, "Can you hear it now?" "Yes." "Mr. Harris," the doctor said, "there is nothing wrong with your hearing. You just don't listen."

This Sunday's Gospel tells us of how Jesus called the disciples to 'Follow me and I will make you fishers of men.' "At once, leaving the boat and their father, they followed him." To follow Jesus is to enter into discipleship, to accept a challenge to transform our lifestyle. There are people who started out very dramatically following Jesus but they lose heart along the way unless they seriously believe in Jesus' message, "Repent, for the kingdom of heaven is close at hand."



Repent calls for a change of mind and heart. We tend to be fixated with our ideas, opinions and actions which determine the way we see ourselves and others. We often see others not as they are but as we are. Repentance is a call for conversion and willingness to be transformed. Conversion is certainly not something we can bring about ourselves. It is not simply a question of will-power. We have to listen well to the inner voice that shows the way. In the silence we will have to read our own hearts, our fears, our failures and our hopes, and this takes courage because we are challenged to respond to this like the disciples in the Gospel who listened to Jesus' call and responded. Their lives completely changed, because their goals have changed and their desire is to do God's will.

Let us strife to listen well to Jesus' voice and be transformed to a new life of freedom, peace and joy.

Feasts of the Week



St Francis de Sales St Francis de Sales was born to a noble family at Chateau de Sales in the Kingdom of Savoy near Geneva, Switzerland on August 21, 1567. He was a Bishop and Doctor of the Church. Francis was both intelligent and gentle. From a very early age, he desired to serve God. He knew for years he had a vocation to the priesthood, but kept it from his family.

His father wanted him to enter a career in law and politics. In 1580, Francis attended the University of Paris, and at 24 years-old, he received his doctorate in law at the University of Padua. All the time, he never lost his passion for God. He studied theology and practiced mental prayers, but kept quiet about his devotion. To please his father, he also studied fencing and riding. God made this will clear to Francis one day while he was riding. Francis fell from his horse three times that day. Every time he fell, the sword came out of the scabbard, and every time it came out, the sword and scabbard came to rest on the ground in the shape of the Christian cross. After much discussion and disagreement from his father, Francis was ordained to the priesthood and elected provost of the Diocese of Geneva, in 1593, by the Bishop of Geneva.

Feast Day: January 24



St. Paul is the patron saint of missionaries, evangelists, writers, journalists, authors, public workers, rope and saddle makers, and tent makers. His feast day is on June 29 when he is honoured with Saint Peter, although he is also honoured on other days throughout the year, January 25, for his conversion, February 16, for his shipwreck, and November 18 for the dedication of his Basilica.



St Angela Merici was an Italian religious educator, who is honoured as a saint by the Roman Catholic Church. She founded the Company of St Ursula in 1535 in Brescia, in which women dedication their lives to the service of the Church through education of girls. While making a pilgrimage to the Holy Land in 1524, she stopped on the island of Crete,

suddenly fell ill and went blind! Determined not to let a small thing like blindness stop her, she insisted she continue with her journey and visited the Holy sites "seeing" them with her mind and heart! On her return trip, she once again stopped at the exact spot where she went blind, and while praying before a crucifix, her eyesight was miraculously restored to her.

Feast Day: January 27



Sts Timothy and Titus

St. Timothy, born in Galatia in Asia Minor, was baptized and later ordained to the priesthood by St. Paul. The young Galatian became Paul's missionary companion and his most beloved spiritual son. St. Paul showed his trust in this

disciple by consecrating him bishop of the great city of Ephesus. St. Timothy was stoned to death thirty years after St. Paul's martyrdom for having denounced the worship of the goddess Diana.

St. Titus, a convert from paganism, was a fellow labourer of St. Paul on many apostolic missions. St. Paul later made him bishop of Crete, a difficult charge because of the character of the Inhabitants and the spread of erroneous doctrines on that island. St. Paul's writings tell us that St. Titus rejoiced to discover what was good in others and drew the hearts of men by his wide and affectionate sympathy.

Feast day: January 27



St Thomas Aquinas surpassed all his fellow students in learning and virtue. He entered the order of St Domenic against his parents wishes and persevered in his vocation. He studied under St. Albert the Great and at age 22 began teaching and publishing his first works. At age 31 he received his doctorate. He wrote

and preached often and was one of the greatest and influential theologians of all time. He is one of the few Doctors of the Church.



telling me, my dear brothers, it is clear that there are serious differences among you. Was it Paul that was crucified for you? Were you baptised in the name of Paul?

For Christ did not send me to baptise, but to preach the Good News, and not to preach that in the terms of philosophy in which the crucifixion of Christ cannot be expressed.

And he said to them, 'Follow me and I will make you fishers of men.' And they left their nets at once and followed him. Going on from there he saw another pair of brothers, James son of Zebedee and his brother John; they were in their boat with their father Zebedee, mending their

nets, and he called them. At once, leaving the boat and their father, they followed him.

He went round the whole of Galilee teaching in their synagogues, proclaiming the Good News of the kingdom and curing all kinds of diseases and sickness among the people.
