Forgive

A young man in the village had been badly insulted, and he hurried to his pastor to tell him about it, adding that he was going immediately to his offender and avenge his honour. "Better go home, son," said the pastor, kindly. "But I've been insulted!" protested the young man. "That's exactly why you should go home at this time. An insult is like mud." "I know that...and I'm going to clean it up." "Son, there is one thing you might as well learn now than later. Mud brushes off a lot more easily when it is dry."

In the Gospel today, Jesus said to his disciples: "You have learnt how it was said: Eye for eye and tooth for tooth. But I say this to you: offer the wicked man no resistance. On the contrary, if anyone hits you on the right cheek, offer him the other as well." The question of forgiveness is a most crucial one for all of us. That is why it is the most central, novel and challenging aspect of Christ's teaching. He talks about the need to forgive not just seven times but seventy times seven times. He teaches us to pray, "Forgive us our sins, as we forgive those who sin against us." He gives us the example of

Forgive others, not because they deserve forgiveness, but because you deserve peace.

forgiveness from the Cross: "Father, forgive them for they do not know what they do." This is also the issue in the stories of healing of the blind and the paralysed. Our blindness and paralysis come from the bitterness and lack of forgiveness that is with in us.

Carl Jung, the Psychologist, said that many people are suffering enormously now because they failed to suffer little things in the past. A person is hurt: he or she does not accept and deal with the hurt. It lies in the heart. Because of this the joys of the next day cannot be received and enjoyed. So the pile up continues. The doors of the heart are clogged. Only bitterness is experienced. "For if you love those who love you, what right have you to claim any credit? Even the tax collectors do as much, do they not?"

Let us pray that with the grace of God we can entrust all of our burden, grudges, hurt and anger in his hand and we will try to be more forgiving and understanding so that we can live our life in peace and love with others.

Catechism of the Catholic Church

2262 In the Sermon on the Mount, the Lord recalls the commandment, "You shall not kill," and adds to it the proscription of anger, hatred, and vengeance. Going further, Christ asks his disciples to turn the other cheek, to love their enemies. He did not defend himself and told Peter to leave his sword in its sheath.

To forgive is to set a prisoner free and discover that the prisoner was you.

made with meat - includes all the Fridays of Lent) binds those who have completed their 14th year (CCL 97, 1251-52).



Turn away The Season of Lent

Lent is the most appropriate time for celebrating the Sacrament of Penance.
Already on Ash Wednesday the people of God have heard the solemn invitation, *Turn away from sin and believe the Good News*. It is therefore fitting to have several penitential

celebrations during Lent, so that all the faithful may have an opportunity to be reconciled with God and their neighbour and so be able to celebrate the paschal mystery in the Easter Triduum with renewed hearts. RP13. The Sacrament of Penance is better celebrated before rather than after the Easter Triduum. *ORDO 2016*

Feasts of the Week



St Peter Damian

Peter was born in Italy in 1007. When his parents died, he went to live with one of his older brothers, who treated him cruelly. Sometimes Peter was forbidden to eat any of his brother's food. Another brother helped solve the problem by giving Peter money so that he could afford to go away to school. Peter did so well in

school that he became a professor when he was only 25. Peter became a priest and then a Benedictine monk. He spent his days in prayer and study. After a short time Peter was elected abbot, or superior, of the community. Although this new responsibility took Peter away from his quiet life, he was an excellent leader. Peter was ordained the bishop of Ostia, a diocese near Rome. As bishop, Peter worked to solve problems in his diocese and to remind his priests of their mission. Pope Stephen X recognized Peter's gifts and asked him to represent the Church in settling disputes and helping to stop practices that were preventing the Church from doing Christ's work in the world As a monk, a bishop, and a saint, Peter Damian lived one of the Benedictine Rules completely: "Do not prefer anything to the love of Christ." He died in 1072 and is considered to be a Doctor of the Church. St. Peter Damian helps us to remember that if we put Jesus first in our lives, the Lord will always guide us in living as his faithful disciples.
