# God dwells within us

There was a man who just got a job painting the white lines in the middle of the road. On his first day he painted one hundred metres length, seventy on the second day and only thirty on the third. The supervisor was rather surprised. He called this man in and said, "How come you painted one hundred metres on the first day but less on the second and today only thirty metres?" "Sir" he protested "Can't you see the can of paint was getting further and further away!" The man's progress was limited by his thinking that the can of paint could only be at one place to which he had to continue to go back to. It would improve immensely when he

found that he could move the can of paint along or even bring it with him all the time.

Our spiritual progress is also inhibited if we have a limited perception of where and who God is. For many people God is in heaven, so far away from our reach, and religion is a way to capture the distant God and make God present to us. Maybe this is why many people keep running around in search for God in spectacular sights or weeping statues.

The doctrine of the Trinity which we celebrate today, reveals to us different modes of God's presence. In his book Apostolic Exhortation 'Pastores Dabo Vobis' Pope John Paul II says, "Every Christian identity has its source in the Blessed Trinity. Intimate Communion with the Blessed Trinity, that is, the new life of Grace which makes us children of God, constitutes the 'novelty' of the believer. A novelty which involves his being and his acting. It constitutes the 'mystery of Christian existence which is under the influence of the Spirit." (46)

According to this teaching our God is not only a transcendent one in heaven but also a God who became incarnate, who was born of a virgin and became one of us in all but sin. This God not only came into the world but continues to journey with us today in the world through his Holy Spirit. He is a God who dwells in every human heart. So our sense of the divine presence is more complete and rich. We know very, very little about God but it is more important if we can respond to the loving God whom we know and believe. Since the second Vatican Council, the church has redefined itself as the people of God.

Let us pray that as the people of God, may we be the main signs and witnesses of God's presence in the world.

#### Something to think about

The Trinity-the term expresses the greatest mystery at the heart of the Christian tradition: the belief that there is one God who is three Persons sharing one nature. Catholics believe in a personal God, one who is interested in us and whom we can get to know better through prayer, reflection, following Church teaching and receiving the sacraments. The Apostles' Creed spells out our belief in God the Father Almighty, in his only Son our Lord and in the Holy Spirit.



## Feasts of the Week



#### St Boniface

Beneath a mighty oak tree, St Boniface once stopped some pagans from the bloody sacrifice of a boy by blocking the death blow of a hammer with his Bishop's crook thereby splitting the hammer in two. Boniface then told the people of Jesus Christ, mankind's saviour who sacrificed himself so that

others may live forever. A nearby fir tree was to be a symbol of Christ, for its leaves are evergreen and pointed toward heaven. The tree was to be taken into their homes, "not to shelter deeds of blood, but loving gifts and rites of kindness".

#### St Norbert

Norbert of Xanten also known as Norbert Gennep, was a nobleman, courtier, ascetic, legendary peacemaker, and an exemplar of the apostolic way of life. He was a priest of the Catholic Church who founded the Praemonstratensians of the Norbertine order in the 12th Century. His founding of the Order

was a monumental tasks: combating rampant heresies—particularly regarding the Blessed Sacrament, revitalizing many of the faithful who had grown indifferent and dissolute, plus effecting peace and reconciliation among enemies. He built the order on the basis of love selfless sharing and radical hospitality. He became a bishop and is venerated as a saint. He died on June 6, 1134. He was canonized by Pope Gregory XIII in the year 1582, and his statue appear above the Piazza colonnade of St Peter's Square in Rome.

#### St Marcellin Champagnat

Marcellin Joseph Benedict Champagnat, FMS, also known as Saint Marcellin Champagnat, was born in Le Rosey, village of Marlhes, near St. Etienne, France. He was the founder of the Marist Brothers, a religious congregation of brothers in the Catholic Church devoted to Mary and dedicated to education

Church devoted to Mary and dedicated to education. Marcellin often proclaimed, "This is all God's work...this is all Mary's work." That remains true to the spirit of today's Marist Brothers and their lay colleagues as they respond in fresh, bold and creative ways to meet the needs of youth.

In 1955 Marcellin Champagnat was declared Blessed by Pope Pius XII. He was canonized by Pope John Paul II on April 18, 1999.

#### St Ephrem

St Ephrem was born in Mesopotamia in the early fourth century. He was a teacher and a deacon and wrote hymns to counteract the heresies rampant at that time. He lived an ascetic and celibate life in his last years and devoted much of his time to prayer and good deeds. He organised the distribution of food in the famine of 372.

Throughout the year the parish has a number of collections. On a weekly basis the Parish has two regular Collections. I have noticed that some of the parishioners are not sure what the collections mean.

#### The First Collection

Your contribution for the First Collection on Sundays and your gifts at baptism and marriages together pays priests stipend and his living. If there is any surplus, it is given to the common pooling of the archdiocese to pay priests in smaller parishes and priests on sick leave.

#### The Second Collection

The second collection taken during Sunday Masses is for the support of the Parish. Though a lot of the pastoral work of the parish is done by volunteers, there are a number of wages and bills to pay in relation to the running of the Parish responsibility. Our Church and premises always need maintenance work for the upkeep. Yearly building insurance for all buildings including office, hall and carpark. The secretary's wages are paid from this collection. Second Collection is to support these undertakings. To enable tax deductibility for the contributors and to make financial planning easy, we have the Planned Giving (envelope) Program. At the end of each financial year all contributors are provided with a receipt. You can either donate through weekly envelopes or authorise the parish office to make periodic deductions from your credit card. To join the Planned Giving Program, you may fill in the slip in this Parish Bulletin or visit the Parish Website and download a credit card authority form and return them to the Parish Office.
