# Reflect on what is important.

There was a rich restaurant owner who is dying on a bed. While he was breathing heavily, the doctor calls his family members together and tells them that he only has a few more hours to live. So they all gather around his bed. The doctor wakes him up so they can say goodbye. The man opens his eyes, murmuring: "Thank you my loving wife, John my eldest son, Jane and Jean my daughters, Steve and Brian my sons, for being here with me." He suddenly startled and called out, "O my God, you're all here! Then who is looking after the restaurant?" 'Where our treasure is, our thought is.'

In today's Gospel, Jesus describes people who discover the beauty of the kingdom of heaven will do everything they can to obtain it. It requires a total commitment and total letting go of self. The first part is about the man who stumbles on a treasure by accident in a field and then goes and sells everything that he has so that he can buy the field. The second is about the merchant who has been searching and who on finding a special pearl sells all that he has and buys it. The third parable is about the fishing net that catches worthless fish as well as good ones. In every vocation we're called to be, we need to reflect on what's important and give meaning to our lives. For instance, if we consider Jesus' message is important then we'll meditate on his words and respond to it whole heartedly. If we consider family gives



meaning to our lives then we will spend time and put our effort in deepening the relationship of our family members. These commitments are relevant to our prayer life, which will help us to experience the joy of a committed life.

Let us pray that we will choose wisely what is important to our lives and may we treasure it and dedicate ourselves to its values.

#### **Catechism of the Catholic Church**

546 Jesus' invitation to enter his kingdom comes in the form of parables, a characteristic feature of his teaching. Through his parables he invites people to the feast of the kingdom, but he also asks for a radical choice: to gain the kingdom one must give up everything...

Before you criticize someone, walk a mile in their shoes; That way, when you criticize them, you will be a mile away and you will have their shoes. # Feasts of the Week



St Ignatius of Loyola was born in Spain. He was a soldier in the Spanish army in wars against the French. After the military he studied the Saints and decided to be a soldier of the catholic faith. Along with St Francis Xavier and 7 other students, started the Society of Jesus or Jesuits in 1534. The Society of Jesus found its niche in education. Before Ignatius died in 1556, his

order established 35 schools and boasted 1,000 members. Today, the Society of Jesus is known for its work in educating the youth around the world. Several universities have been founded in the name of Ignatius and in the traditional Jesuit spirit. The Jesuits also perform many other important works around the globe.

Feast Day: July 31



St Alphonsus Liguori was born in the village of Marianella near Naples, Italy, September 27, 1696. At the age of sixteen, he graduated in law. Shortly after, he was admitted to the Neopolitan bar. In 1723, he lost a case, and God made use of his disappointment to wean his heart from the world. In 1726 he was ordained a priest. In 1732, God called him to found the

Congregation of the Most Holy Redeemer. About 1756, he was appointed Bishop of St. Agatha, a diocese he governed until 1775, when broken by age and infirmity, he resigned this office to retire to his convent where he died. Few saints have laboured as much, either by word or by writing, as St. Alphonsus. He was a prolific and popular author, the utility of whose works will never cease. His last years were characterized by intense suffering, which he bore with resignation, adding voluntary mortifications to his other pains. His happy death occurred at Nocera de Pagani, August 1, 1787.

Feast Day: August 1



St Dominic was born into a rich, nobel Spanish family. By the time he was 21 he had sold everything he owned so that he could help feed the homeless population of Spain. He was a Castilian priest and founder of the Dominican Order and was friends with St Francis of Assisi. He pursued a life of humility and obedience dying at 51.

Feast Day: August 3



#### St John Vianney

St John Baptiste Vianney was born in France in 1786.
After being drafted into the army, he deserted and returned home and entered the seminary in 1813. He was assigned to Ecully and in 1818 he became Cure, as pastor of Ars. He spent 11 to twelve hours each day

working to reconcile people with God. In the summer months, he often worked 16-hour days working in the confessional, administering the Sacrament of Penance, or Reconciliation. St. John Vianney would often say: "Private prayer is like straw scattered here and there: If you set it on fire, it makes a lot of little flames. But gather these straws into a bundle and light them, and you get a mighty fire, rising like a column into the sky; public prayer is like that."

However, we need stock!


Are you able to help us by propagating plants with cuttings from your gardens?

# First reading 1 Kings 3:5, 7-12 A reading from the first book of the Kings

## Gospel Matthew 13:44-52 A reading from the Holy Gospel according to Matthew


