Have strength and courage

A small foreign car tailgated James for several blocks through the streets of the city. He tried in vain to discourage the small car from following too closely. Then thirty blocks from home, James had all he could take. He pulled to the curb. So did the little car. Angrily James got out, ready to read the riot act to the other driver, and discovered that the foreign car was attached to the rear bumper of his own car. The two vehicles, police theorised, probably came entangled when James backed up in front of his house. Is something unpleasant tailgating you? Perhaps you're dragging something you shouldn't. Think a minute.

In the readings today, Paul says that his life unfolds under the shadow of the Cross. This is the acceptable sacrifice of mercy that, once fulfilled in Jesus Christ, continues as an act of communion between the disciple and the master. Furthermore, Jesus invites his own disciples to the fulfilment of this communion

which is destined to grow on the journey towards Jerusalem. "If anyone wants to be a follower of mine, let him renounce himself and take up his cross and follow me." Jesus challenged us to face our problems, sufferings, crises instead of trying to avoid them.

The Psychiatrist Scott Peck says that 'the tendency to avoid problems and the emotional suffering inherent in us is the primary basis of all human mental illness'. Or in the succinctly elegant words of Carl Jung, "Neurosis is always a substitute for legitimate suffering' But the suffering itself



becomes more painful than the legitimate suffering it was designed to avoid." To conclude, problems and sufferings are essential to our growth as soil and fertilizer is for plants. It is true that we don't go around in search for problems and sufferings but let us pray that when they come our way, may we have the courage and strength to face this reality of life instead of turning away or trying to avoid them.

Catechism of the Catholic Church

618 The cross is the unique sacrifice of Christ, the 'one mediator between God and men'. But because in his incarnate divine person he has in some way united himself to every man, 'the possibility of being made partners, in a way known to god, in the paschal mystery' is offered to all men. He calls his disciples to 'take up (their) cross and follow (him)', for 'Christ also suffered for (us), leaving (us) an example so that (we) should follow in his steps'. In fact Jesus desires to associate with his redeeming sacrifice those who were to be its first beneficiaries.

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The Nativity of the Blessed Virgin Mary is the day on which Christians commemorate the birth of Mary, the Mother of God. Mary's parents Anna and Joachim are infertile but pray for a child. They received the promise of a child and Mary was born to be the mother of the Saviour of the world, the

spiritual mother of all men, and the holiest of God's creatures. This is one of the three birthdays in the Church calendar—the Birth of Jesus, the Birth of John the Baptist and the Birthday of Mary. All three were born without original sin, although Mary and Jesus were conceived without sin, and St John was cleansed of original sin while in the womb at the Visitation of Mary.

St Peter Claver

in 1580, of impoverished parents descended from ancient and distinguished families. He studied at the Jesuit college of Barcelona, entered the Jesuit novitiate at Tarragona in 1602 and took his final vows on August 8th, 1604. While studying philosophy at Majorca, the young religious was

influenced by St. Alphonsus Rodriguez to go to the Indies and save "millions of perishing souls."

In 1610, he landed at Cartagena (modern Colombia), the principle slave market of the New World, where a thousand slaves were landed every month. After his ordination in 1616, he dedicated himself by special vow to the service of the Negro slaves-a work that was to last for thirty-three years. He labored unceasingly for the salvation of the African slaves and the abolition of the Negro slave trade, and the love he lavished on them was something that transcended the natural order. Boarding the slave ships as they entered the harbor, he would hurry to the revolting inferno of the hold, and offer whatever poor refreshments he could afford; he would care for the sick and dying, and instruct the slaves through Negro catechists before administering the Sacraments. Through his efforts three hundred thousand souls entered the Church. Furthermore, he did not lose sight of his converts when they left the ships, but followed them to the plantations to which they were sent, encouraged them to live as Christians, and prevailed on their masters to treat them humanely. He died in 1654.
