# God's Vineyard

A ranger stopped a fisherman and asked to see his fishing licence. "This is last year's licence," the ranger informed him. "I know", said the fisherman, "But I shouldn't need a new licence, I am only catching the fish that I missed last year."

In today's Gospel story we read of the owner of the vineyard who sends out his servants to collect from his tenants. But the tenants beat one, killed another and stoned a third. After this pattern was repeated the landowner decided to send his own son, thinking, "They will respect my son." But they dragged him outside

the vineyard and killed him. The allegory is clear. The owner is God and the tenants are the people of Israel, the Jews. The servants are the Prophets and the various messengers and were sent to convert Israel. The Son is Jesus who was taken outside the city of Jerusalem and killed. The vineyard was then given to other tenants, the



Gentiles or the non Jews in other words to all who became believers. This important shift indicates that God is no longer sought only in a particular group but inclusively God sought among all people who are conscious of God's work and of the role God entrusted to them.

Today we are called to acknowledge God's presence in all people and in all places. This development must begin with our personal prayer lives. It is from being present in prayer at our own centres that we learn to be present to liturgy, worship and God's work.

Let us be conscious and grateful of our life and what God entrusted to us, may we try our best to live our life and to bring God's work to its fulfilment.

#### **Catechism of the Catholic Church**

755. 'The Church is a cultivated field, the tillage of God. On that land the ancient olive tree grows whose holy roots were the prophets and in which the reconciliation of Jews and Gentiles has been brought about and will be brought about again. # Feasts of the Week



St Denis or Dionysius as he is also called) was born and raised in Italy, he was sent as a missionary to Gaul (now France) circa 250 A.D. by Pope St Clement along with five other bishops. Denis made his base missionary activity an island in the Seine near the city of Lutetia Parisorium -- what

would become Paris. For this reason he is know as the first bishop of Paris and the Apostle of France. There he was captured by the Parisians along with Rusticus and Eleutherius. After a long imprisonment and several aborted executions, the three martyrs were beheaded with a sword and their bodies were thrown into the river. Denis' body was retrieved from the Seine by his converts and buried. The chapel that was built over his tomb grew into the abbey of Saint Denis. Denis is pictured as he was martyred—headless (with a vine growing over the neck) and carrying his own mitred head. Feast Day: October 9



St John Leonardi was born at Diecimo, Italy. He became a pharmacist's assistant at Lucca, studied for the priesthood, and was ordained in 1572. He gathered a group of laymen about him to work in hospitals and prisons, became interested in the reforms proposed by the Council of Trent,

and proposed a new congregation of secular priests. Great to his proposal developed, but in 1583, his association (formally designated Clerks Regular of the Mother of God in 1621) was recognised by the bishop of Lucca with the approval of Pope Gregory XIII. John was aided by St. Philip Neri and St. Joseph Calasanctius, and in 1595, the congregation was confirmed by Pope Clement VIII, who appointed John to reform the monks of Vallombrosa and Monte Vergine. He died in Rome on October 9th of plague contracted while he was ministering to the stricken. He was venerated for his miracles and religious fervour and is considered one of the founders of the College for the Propagation of the Faith. He was canonized in 1938 by Pope Pius XI.

Feast Day: October 9



St John XXIII was born Angelo Giuseppe Roncalli on 25th November, 1881 in Sotto il Monte, Italy and died from cancer on 3rd June, 1963. He was the 260th successor of

St Peter. He was one of the most popular and influential popes of all times reigning from 1958-1963 and inaugurated a new era in the history of the Roman Catholic Church by his openness to change, shown especially in convening the Second Vatican Council and changing the Church forever. He wrote several socially important encyclicals, most notably *Pacem in Terris*. He was beatified on 3rd September, 2000 and canonized on 27th April, 2014.

Feast Day: October 11



St Callistus I began his life as a slave. The saint caused a major controversy, including a schism that lasted almost two decades, by choosing to emphasize God's mercy in his

ministry. However, the early Pope's model of leadership has endured, and his martyrdom in the year 222 confirmed his example of holiness. Because no completely trustworthy biography of Pope Callistus I exists, historians have been forced to rely on an account by his ecclesial enemies, Hippolytus, so it presents a somewhat biased and unfavorable view of Callistus. Hippolytus was the clear favorite for papal election but he was passed over in favor of Callistus, causing Hippolytus no small amount of envy. Hippolytus vehemently disagreed with Callistus' policy of reversing the excommunications of those who had committed murder and adultery and bringing them back into the Church, upon their repentance.



#### Gospel Matthew 21:33-43 A reading from the Holy Gospel according to Matthew

Jesus said to the chief priests and the elders of the people, 'Listen to another parable. There was a man, a landowner, who planted a vineyard; he fenced it round, dug a winepress in it and built a tower; then he leased it to tenants and went abroad. When vintage time drew near he sent his servants to the tenants to collect his produce. But the tenants seized his servants, thrashed one, killed another and stoned a third. Next he sent some more servants, this time a larger number, and they dealt with them in the same way. Finally he sent his son to them. "They will respect my son" he said. But when the tenants saw the son, they said to each other, "This is the heir. Come on, let us kill him and take over his inheritance." So they seized him and threw him out of the vineyard and killed him. Now when the owner of the vineyard comes, what will he do to those tenants?' They answered, 'He will bring those wretches to a wretched end and lease the vineyard to

wretched end and lease the vineyard to other tenants who will deliver the produce to him when the season arrives.' Jesus said to them, 'Have you never read in the scriptures:

It was the stone rejected by the builders that became the keystone. This was the Lord's doing and it is wonderful to see?

'I tell you, then, that the kingdom of God will be taken from you and given to a people who will produce its fruit.'
