"Blessed are those who have not seen but believe."

The interviewer asked Joseph of Arimathea, "Now the grave you lent is yours again. What are you planning to do with it?" Joseph took a long look at him, and then confided, "When I heard that He had risen, naturally I raced to the tomb. He was not there. He had given my tomb back to me. So what I did after that was: I placed a comfortable bench under the trees just opposite the opening of the tomb. In the evening, as the sun is going down, I go and sit there and I think to myself, 'Jesus of Nazareth has slept in this tomb, and what will God do with him?' Jesus had said, "I live and you shall live." I believe in those words.

In today's Gospel we read about the other disciples who have seen the Lord and are convinced but Thomas cannot accept that Jesus who died is now alive. He

is caught between fidelity to his inner sense of truth - he who has died cannot be alive - and his tendency to conform and accept the words of others. His sense of inner integrity demands that he does not give just for the sake of peace, yet he does not protest just for the sake of controversy. He knew that Jesus was crucified, and now his friends say that Jesus had visited them. It just did not fit.



Jesus appears to Thomas. During his lifetime Jesus had consistently refused to authenticate himself by marvellous doings, turning stones into bread, taking over power, jumping from the top of the temple, coming down from the cross. But now the risen Jesus volunteers to authenticate himself by showing his wounds. And Thomas is convinced. He is set free to accept the paradox. He says, "My Lord and my God!" Jesus responds, "Blessed are those who have not seen but believe."

We all have a desire to experience the extraordinary; miracles and dancing sun, statues shedding oil or blood but Jesus is often found in the ordinary. Faith is ultimately in the graceful acceptance of paradox. Let us pray that our faith in the resurrection will help us to accept joyfully of what is apparently contradictory i.e. love instead of hatred; hope instead of despair, light instead of darkness.

Catechism of the Catholic Church

644 Even when faced with the reality of the risen Jesus the disciples are still doubtful... St Matthew relates that during the risen Lord's last appearance in Galilee 'some doubted.' Therefore the hypothesis that the resurrection was produced by the apostles' faith (or credulity) will not hold up. On the contrary their faith in the resurrection was born, under the action of divine grace, from their direct experience of the reality of the risen Jesus.

- Children's Liturgy Leaders
- Acolytes, Senior Altar Servers

If you volunteer in any of these ministries a WWCC needs to be submitted to the Parish Office before commenting in the role. WWCCs are renewed every 5 years and the updated WCC also needs to be submitted to the Parish Office. Your date of birth and address is also required to allow the parish secretary to verify the WWCC with the Office of Child Protection.

DIVINE MERCY SUNDAY

Divine Mercy Sunday (also known as the Feast of the Divine Mercy) is celebrated on the Second Sunday of Easter, which concludes the Octave of

Easter. The feast day is observed by Roman Catholics as well as some Anglicans.[1] It is originally based on the Catholic devotion to the Divine Mercy that Sister Faustina Kowalska reported as part of her encounter with Jesus, and is associated with special promises from Jesus and indulgences issued by the Catholic Church.

The feast of Divine Mercy, according to the diary of Sr Kowalska, receives from Jesus the biggest promises of grace related to the Devotion of Divine Mercy, in particular that a person who goes to sacramental confession (the confession may take place some days before) and receives holy communion on that day, shall obtain the total expiation of all sins and punishment. That means each person would go immediately after death to heaven without suffering in purgatory. Additionally, the Roman Catholic Church grants a plenary indulgence (observing the usual rules) with the recitation of some simple prayers. From Google source.



The Annunciation of the Lord

The Annunciation is a day of celebration for Christians throughout the world. Many religious including the Catholic Church, the Lutheran Church, the Greek Orthodox religion, and others hold the Annunciation as a very important day of religious life. The day commemorates the visit of

the Archangel Gabriel to the Virgin Mary, during which he informed her that she would be the mother of Jesus Christ, the Son of God. It is celebrated on 25 March each year. In the Roman Catholic Church, when 25 March falls during the Paschal Triduum, it is transferred, even if it falls on Pascha (Easter). The concurrence of these two feasts is called Kvriopascha, Feast Dav: March 25



St Stanislaus

Stanislaus was born of noble parents on July 26th at Szczepanow near Cracow, Poland. He was educated at Gnesen and was ordained there. He was given a canonry by Bishop Lampert Zula of Cracow, who made him his preacher, and soon he became noted for his preaching. He became a much sought after spiritual adviser. He was

successful in his reforming efforts, and in 1072 was named Bishop of Cracow. He incurred the enmity of King Boleslaus the Bold when he denounced the King's cruelties and injustices and especially his kidnapping of the beautiful wife of a nobleman. When Stanislaus excommunicated the King and stopped services at the Cathedral when Boleslaus entered, Boleslaus himself killed Stanislaus while the Bishop was saying Mass in a chapel outside the city on April 11. Stanislaus has long been the symbol of Polish nationhood. He was canonized by Pope Innocent IV in 1253 and is the principle patron of Cracow.





'As the Father sent me, so am I sending you.'

Thomas, called the Twin, who was one of the Twelve, was not with them when Jesus came. Then he spoke to Thomas, 'Put your finger here; look, here are my hands. Give me your hand; put it into my side. Doubt no longer but believe.' Thomas

replied, 'My Lord and my God!' Jesus said to him:

'You believe because you can see
