The Good Shepherd

One day as Gandhi stepped aboard a train, one of his shoes slipped off and landed on the track. He was unable to retrieve it as the train was moving away. To the amazement of his companions, without hesitation Gandhi calmly took off his other shoe and threw back along the track to land close to the first. Asked by a fellow passenger why he did so, Gandhi smiled, "The one who finds the shoes lying on the track, will now have a pair that he can use." Gandhi conscious of the needs of others, knew and lived Jesus' words closely. "I am the good shepherd. The good shepherd lays down his life for the sheep." There are three qualities that speak about a good shepherd that is 'understanding, caring and self-sacrificing'. For Jesus, the true disciple was the good shepherd who was deeply committed to his sheep. He knew where the good pastures were and led the sheep to them, even over rough ground. The good shepherd would lead and walk ahead of his flock.

Today's gospel on the Good Shepherd Sunday reminds us that Jesus considers each one of us as his own. His love and concern for us is always personal. "I know mine and mine know me, just as the Father knows me and I know the Father." While it is true that all of us belong to one human race, his love for each one of us is always uniquely special. He knows all of us by name. It is precisely because his love for each



one is unique that the care he bestows is always suited to one's needs, one's temperament and psychological makeup. It is a love that respects and gives consideration for our individual uniqueness as persons.

We are all called to be good shepherds in our own right. Some of us may hold seemingly ordinary positions, but none of these are insignificant. For instance: parents to their children, teachers to their students, employers to their employees, priests to their parishioners etc.

Let us pray that we are all aware of our roles and commitments towards others especially to those whom we are called to be good shepherds to.

Catechism of the Catholic Church

754 The church is, accordingly, a sheepfold, the sole and necessary gateway to which is Christ. It is also a flock of which God himself foretold that he would be the shepherd, and whose sheep, even though governed by human shepherds, are unfailingly nourished and led by Christ himself, the Good Shepherd and Prince of Shepherds, who gave his life for his sheep.

- ♦ Sacramental Group Leaders
- ♦ Children's Liturgy Leaders
- Acolytes, Senior Altar Servers

If you volunteer in any of these ministries a WWCC needs to be submitted to the Parish Office before commenting in the role. WWCCs are renewed every 5 years and the updated WCC also needs to be submitted to the Parish Office. Your date of birth and address is also required to allow the parish secretary to verify the WWCC with the Office of Child Protection.

Feasts of the Week



St George was born to a Christian family in Cappadocia around the year 280. After moving to Palestine, he joined the army of Diocletian. When the emperor issued the edict of persecution against Christians in 303, George gave all his belongings to

the poor and, in front of Diocletian himself, tore the document apart and professed his faith in Christ. For this he suffered terrible torture and was eventually beheaded. Shortly after his death, a basilica was erected over the place of his burial in Lydda (modern-day Lod, in Israel). His relics are still visible today. Feast Day: April 23



St Adalbert

Adalbert of Prague, known in Czech Republic, Poland and Slovakia by his birth name Vojtěch, was a Bohemian missionary and Christian saint. He was the Bishop of Prague and a missionary to the Hungarians,

Poles, and Prussians, who was martyred in his efforts to convert the Baltic Prussians to Christianity. Feast Day: April 23



St Fidelis of Singmaringen

Franciscan Capuchin martyr. He was born Mark Rey in Sigmaringen, Germany, in 1577. A practicing lawyer, he travelled across Europe as a tutor to aristocrats but then started defending the poor. In 1612, he became a Franciscan Capuchin mank, taking the name of Fidelis.

Franciscan Capuchin monk, taking the name of Fidelis. A missionary to Grisons, Switzerland, Fidelis was so successful that local Protestants claimed that he was a spy for the Austrian Emperor. Fidelis was stabbed to death in a church in Seewis. He was canonized by Pope Benedict XIV. Fidelis served also as the head of the Congregation for the Spreading of the Faith.

Feast Day: April 24



St Mark

Much of what we know about St. Mark, the author of the Second Gospel, comes largely from the New Testament and early Christian traditions. He was the son of Mary of Jerusalem whose home became a meeting place for the apostles. He is also the cousin of St. Barnabas a Levite and a Cypriot. Mark

also held a close relationship with St. Peter and was not one of the twelve apostles. St. Mark lived for years in Alexandria, where he died as a martyr while being dragged through the streets. In 828, relics of St. Mark were stolen from Alexandria and taken to Venice, Italy. There they are enshrined in a beautiful cathedral dedicated to the saint. St. Mark's symbol is a winged lion. Feast Day: April 26



St Louis Grignion de Montfort

Louis Mary Ğrignion was born to a poor family on January 31, 1673 at Montfort, France. He was educated at the Jesuit college in Rennes and was ordained there in 1700. He was assigned as chaplain

to a hospital at Poitiers, and his much needed reorganization of the hospital staff caused great resentment, leading to his resignation. However, during his stay there he organized a group of women into the Congregation of the Daughters of Divine Wisdom. Eventually Louis went to Rome where Pope Clement XI appointed him missionary apostolic, and he began to preach in Brittany. His emotional style caused much reaction, but he was successful, especially in furthering devotion to the Most Blessed Virgin through the Rosary. He also wrote a very popular book, True Devotion to the Blessed Virgin. In 1715, Louis organized several priests and formed the Missionaries of the Company of Mary. He died in 1716 at Saint-Laurent-sur-Sever, France, and was canonized in 1947 by Pope Pius XII. Feast Day: April 28
